Assemblyman Cymbrowitz, Chairman of the Assembly's Alcoholism and Drug Abuse Committee, joined with the Orthodox Union to sponsor a roundtable to explore the growing problem of alcohol and drug abuse in the Jewish community. The experts – rabbis and clinicians – agreed that they are seeing a significantly higher incidence of drug and alcoholism problems in the Jewish community and that there are too few resources. Assemblyman Cymbrowitz and the Orthodox Union will be conducting a town hall meeting on prescription drug abuse in the Jewish Community within the next few months.

Holocaust Contest Ceremony Explored Music During the Holocaust

This year's Holocaust Memorial Essay, Poetry, Performance and Art Contest Awards Ceremony explored music during the Holocaust. Assemblyman Cymbrowitz has sponsored this contest for 12 years to perpetuate the important lessons that are to be learned from this horrific period of history. Over 400 students, parents,

teachers, administrators and community leaders attended the ceremony. Holocaust survivors from the Manhattan Beach Jewish Center participated in a candle lighting ceremony. More than 600 entries were received from public, parochial and private schools, as well as yeshivas.

Assemblyman Cymbrowitz' Office Gets Results

CONSTRUCTION QUIETED FOR SCHOOL TESTS

Assemblyman Cymbrowitz was able to work out a construction schedule with the Health Department for the renovations of their health center on Avenue S that suspended loud drilling during the time students at neighboring PS 255 were taking their standardized tests.

DOG SPARED UNNECESSARY SURGERY

Fluffy is an eleven year old Shitsu. When his owner was asked to pay substantially more to renew his dog license because Fluffy was never neutered (a new law set higher renewal fees for "unfixed" dogs) Assemblyman Cymbrowitz got involved and the Health Department agreed to allow Fluffy's owner to pay the lower dog license fee if a note from the vet stating that the surgery would not be in the best interest of Fluffy's health was provided. The note was submitted and Fluffy didn't have to undergo needless surgery.

INACCURATE POLICE REPORT CORRECTED

What couldn't be resolved in seven years, Assemblyman Cymbrowitz was able to correct. Arthur K. tried unsuccessfully to get the Police Department to remove his vehicle from a car accident report that wrongly included his car because one number of the license plate was incorrect. After Assemblyman Cymbrowitz presented Mr. K's evidence proving that his vehicle was not involved in the accident, the police report was changed.

SHEDS LIGHT ON DANGEROUS CORNER

When the residents living near the corner of Avenue W and East 7th Street complained to Assemblyman Cymbrowitz that the corner was dark and dangerous, he took their case to the Department of Transportation and they agreed. A street light is scheduled to be installed by fall.

Assemblyman Cymbrowitz Condemns NY Times Article Depicting Brighton Beach's Russianspeaking Community as "Criminals" and Calls for an Apology

Incensed that the New York Times attacked a significant portion of the community that he has lived in for 25 years and represented for 12 years, Assemblyman Cymbrowitz and Assemblyman Alec Brook-Krasny held a rally in front of the Shorefront Y condemning a recent article that depicted Brighton Beach's Russian-

speaking community as "criminals...with disdain for the rules and a willingness to cheat to get around them." Surrounded by a large contingent of Brighton Beach's Russian-speaking honest, hardworking residents, Assemblyman Cymbrowitz demanded an apology from The New York Times' publisher, editor and reporter.

Assemblyman Cymbrowitz: State's New Budget A Lot of Numbers that Add Up to Good News

Our State's new \$132.6 billion budget closes a \$3.5 billion deficit and restores critical funding for education and health care without relying on new taxes, fees or gimmicks. One tax, the sales tax on clothing \$110 and under, has been permanently eliminated. Aid to New York City schools was increased by \$292 million, while CUNY community colleges will be benefiting from a \$9.1 million increase in funding and SUNY's community colleges will be receiving an additional \$22.1 million. Also, \$3.5 million was restored to the Higher Education Opportunity Program (HEOP) bringing its funding up to \$24.3 million.

Private schools, including Yeshivas and Catholic schools, will benefit from a restoration of the cost-based formula for the Comprehensive Attendance Policy (CAP) program, as well as a mandate that was part of the budget directing the New York State Department of Education to develop a plan to pay delinquent reimbursements to the religious schools. A \$3 million allocation will provide bus service for New York City private schools that are in session before 9:30 a.m. and after 5:00 p.m.

The Assembly rejected several insurance industry takeover provisions proposed by the Governor, which would have put the Early Intervention program in jeopardy, and restored last year's two percent reduction in payments to service providers. It also rejected a proposal to shift costs from the Pre-school Special Education Program (4410's) to school districts.

The budget has good news for seniors with \$30.6 million being restored to the Elderly Pharmaceutical Insurance Coverage (EPIC) program to help reinstate co-payment assistance for EPIC enrollees. Currently, seniors pay 25 percent of the cost of each prescription drug, which is a heavy burden. With the new funding that Assemblyman Cymbrowitz fought for, enrollees will return to paying no more than a \$20 co-payment for each of their prescriptions beginning January 1, 2013.

If our state's economy is to be robust once again, we will have to create new jobs. This budget provides \$794.6 million to various Empire State Development Corporation projects to help promote business growth with the goal of job creation. It also recognizes that until we improve our state's economic environment there will be New Yorkers who are unemployed. To help those individuals, the Assembly added \$2.25 billion to the Governor's budget allocation providing \$6.5 billion for unemployment insurance benefits.

Mass transportation is very important to residents of our community. That's why Assemblyman Cymbrowitz worked to increase the MTA's funding by five percent over last year and also provide the School Fare Program with \$25 million.

Assemblyman Cymbrowitz Out in Our Community

While Assemblyman Cymbrowitz has to spend part of his schedule in Albany, he dedicates the remainder of his calendar to working in the community. "Meeting with the people I represent enables me to better reflect their views in Albany and to know what local issues need to be addressed," Assemblyman Cymbrowitz explained.
