Prescription Drug Take Backs

As many of us are given more medications to take to stay healthy or to get better, we must be aware that old prescriptions that were not used and are not needed should be properly disposed of. We currently face a problem where youth and young adults are turning to these prescription drugs to get high. We can help prevent this by not leaving old prescriptions around where our family members would have access to take them unnoticed. There are many police departments or local municipalities who will collect these drugs to be safely destroyed. The following is a list of these local places where you can bring your old prescriptions.

2014 Assembly Legislative Priorities for Seniors

A.6239-B Creating State Office of the Utility Consumer Advocate

(Passed Assembly)

New York is currently the largest state in the country without an agency representing residential utilities. Presently, utility consumers are represented by the Public Service Commission and a division of the Department of State, neither of which are able to act solely for the consumers' interests. This bill sets up a new office to represent customers: The Office of Utility Consumer Advocate will sit in on regulatory proceedings and judicial review concerning rates and conditions of utilities. The end result will be quality service at lower cost, allowing consumers a voice at the table that has been, until now, dominated by providers and industry.

A.3751-B Banning Price Gouging on Short-Supply Medicine

(Passed Assembly)

Recent drug shortages have created crises at hospitals where life-saving drugs are in short supply. The cause, however, is preventable. Secondary markets selling drugs to hospitals have been caught raising prices excessively making them unaffordable. Price gouging has clamped supplies for chemotherapy, infections and several serious ailments. As a result, patients have suffered from prolonged pain and inadequate treatment. This bill will put an end to the practice by allowing the Attorney General to prosecute those who excessively raise these prices without justification.

A.1130 Establishment of Council on Senior Centers

(Passed Assembly)

This bill will establish a council to help with the preservation and efficient operation of senior centers. The council would hold forums in which operators of these centers could exchange advice on upkeep, and seniors would be able to offer their input as well. The result will be the enhancement of these communities that have been Coordinator of NICHE Program (Nurses Improving Care for Healthsystem Elders) for senior citizens by discussing issues faced in keeping these centers running efficiently and searching for better ways to assist those who utilize these centers.
