Grant for Red Hook Schools Auditorium



Assemblymember Kevin Cahill appeared at the Red Hook Education Foundation event with his grandson Johnny Cahill Ziegenfuss to announce the grant with Foundation leaders and Superintendent Paul Finch.

On Friday June 23rd I announced that \$3.5 million dollars in State funding was made available to the Red Hook Central School District for construction of a new auditorium at the High School. I secured this allocation through a \$3 million commitment in the 2016-2017 State Budget and with a separate \$500,000 grant. The award was announced at the Red Hook Education Foundation's Gala, a fundraiser that supports educational opportunities in the school system. One of the Foundation's dedicated projects is the development of a new auditorium.

For far too long the Red Hook community has been without an auditorium. It's a place where folks could gather for performances, community meetings and large student events. It is also an important part of education.

In speaking with leaders of the community it is clear that this is a priority for the Town. Residents know the importance of this project, but recognize that some might not be able to handle the financial burden it would place on the local taxpayers. With this State assistance and existing State construction aid, the project can now be presented to voters for their consideration of a significantly reduced local debt. I thank Speaker Carl Heastie, who displayed a deep interest in this issue and whose leadership helped make this investment possible. Thanks also go to our partners in the school system and local advocates who have shepherded the initiative through its planning phase and will ultimately be responsible for its development.

Local Outreach

Setting up office hours in our local libraries offers an opportunity for people who may not live near the District Office to meet my staff and ask any questions they may have so that we can offer support and assistance. Numerous residents of the 103rd Assembly District took advantage of these events.

As always, the District Office in Kingston remains open from 9am to 5pm, Monday through Friday. Hudson River Valley Greenway

Both houses of the Legislature passed a measure continuing the Hudson River Valley Greenway and assuring that localities are indemnified for their participation for the next five years. I sponsored this bill in the Assembly that preserves our region's natural resources and environmental treasures.

The indemnity clause has been the key in getting every municipality in the Hudson Valley to sign on to the Greenway Compact, one of the greatest accomplishments in the State's environmental legacy.

The Greenway has been the most successful inter-municipal cooperative agreement in the history of the State of New York. This bill has been a priority since the beginning of Session and now it will be going to the Governor's desk. The action taken by the Legislature reaffirms our commitment to protecting open space and green space and further facilitates community development in the Hudson Valley.

Water Infrastructure Presentation



Assemblymember Cahill held an informational event regarding the Clean Water Infrastructure Act of 2017 in Kingston at the District Office. Officials from several local governments - mayors, supervisors, grant writers and their staff - attended. The Clean Water Infrastructure Act is a \$2.5 billion initiative that will begin to address many of the concerns raised across New York about water contamination. This amount will be available for repairs to the integrity of the infrastructure used in the delivery of drinking water and the treatment of wastewater. Funding is set aside for municipal undertakings that would have trouble qualifying for State support or may need additional funding to complete a specific project.

The informational portion of the event was presented by Sabrina Ty and her staff from the Environmental Facilities Corporation at the Department of Environmental Conservation whose organization assists localities in finding and applying for clean water grants and also aids in the re-application process for maintaining grants.



During the course of the presentation there was a lot of back and forth conversation between the attendees and Sabrina and her staff. Questions were asked about grant specifics as well as how this could potentially impact current and future infrastructure projects in the District.

Assemblymember Cahill has long been a champion of the environment and, in particular, he has called for significant investments to protect our local water systems and aquifers. This program represents a dramatic step in that direction.

Autonomous Cars

Assemblymember Cahill took a spin in Audi's A7 piloted driving prototype, also known as "Jack." While the vehicle had a human engineer piloting it during the travel through the City of Albany, once on the Thruway, the selfdriving controls took over the task of navigating.
