ALL THE STARS WERE ALIGNED

I am pleased and proud to report that the Central New York Regional Economic Development Council (REDC) was awarded one of the top 3 economic development packages available as a part of the Upstate Revitalization Initiative worth \$500 million, or half-a-billion dollars, over 5 years! The other two regions of Upstate that also received the highest monetary awards were the Finger Lakes Region and the Southern Tier Region.

(As a voting member of the Central New York Council, I have had the privilege and responsibility to participate with other local leaders, including co-chairs SU Chancellor Eric Syverud and CenterState CEO Rob Simpson, in vetting and selecting 93 projects and initiatives which will build on our region’s strong performance in past rounds of the REDC Competition. Major projects, like Sora, an industry leader in ultra-high performance lighting and LED technologies, recently relocated its global manufacturing and research and development operations from California to Onondaga County’s new nontechnology hub and plans to bring 420 jobs here.) These new projects are rooted in our region’s unique natural resources, business and academic advantages, and are focused on strategic initiatives with regional, national and international corporate partners and government that will lead to thousands of new jobs, billions in capital investments and a lasting legacy for the region.

The 6 “signature” investments in CNY’s plan which would create nearly 6,000 jobs over five years include: a Global Center for Unmanned Systems and Cross-Connected Platforms; the Development of Indoor Farms, also known as controlled environment agriculture and aseptic packaging facilities; a Global Manufacturing and Logistics Hub; a National Veterans Resource Complex; a Consensus Commission on Government Modernization; and, programs to Fight Poverty, including strategies to align workers’ skills with the needs of employers. I will be updating you on each of these initiatives as they get underway.

What is most exciting is that the Upstate regions bordering on our Central New York Region, the Finger Lakes Region and the Southern Tier, each won the top awards which now represent 1,062 economic development projects totaling an investment of \$1 billion dollars. The close proximity and connectiveness of our regions will create a critical mass of jobs and national attention for perspective businesses. This investment will also provide incentives for our existing businesses to expand and for our tax base to grow.

Folks, this is the real deal. This is the boost and opportunity that Upstate needs. We cannot squander this chance to re-invent our region, our chance to provide lasting and good-paying jobs, our chance to give our families opportunities right here at home and our chance at putting aside the negativity and cynicism that seems to consume our energies and starts to define who we are.

We are looking at creating our future and I believe that we are up to the task. I will be working hard to make sure that all the dreams we have for our area are truly realized and I look forward to hearing from and meeting with you. I will keep you updated on the progress.



HEAP can help with high home-heating costs this winter




We've been fortunate to experience quite a few warm days this fall, but New York's cold winter weather is coming, and that means turning up our thermostats and shouldering the high costs of heating our homes. For those who fall within certain income guidelines, the Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP) is here to help pay those expensive energy bills.

HEAP is a federally funded program providing relief to those who struggle to afford the cost of heat. Whether you own or rent your home, you can apply for direct benefits to help cover the costs of electricity, propane, natural gas, wood, oil, kerosene, coal or other heating fuels. Repair, replacement and emergency benefits are also available if your home heating equipment is in danger of failing.

Eligibility for HEAP relies on numerous factors, including income, household size, primary heating source and whether a member of the household is under the age of 6, over the age of 60 or permanently disabled. However, this season, a household of four could earn up to \$51,792 per year and still qualify for a one-time benefit of up to \$625 to help heat their home.

Last year, more than 1.4 million households received HEAP benefits. Enrollment for this winter is now open, so if you anticipate difficulty paying your heating bills I encourage you to contact mybenefits.ny.gov to apply for assistance. As the rising cost of heating our homes makes it difficult for Central New York households to make ends meet, it's essential that we ensure working families as well as elderly New Yorkers have the resources they need to stave off the harsh winter weather. Be vigilant against scams and identity theft

The holiday season is upon us, and it's a good time to remember to be vigilant against scams and identity theft. Every year, criminals steal billions of dollars and millions of identities from unsuspecting consumers.

It's important to pick up on the warning signs of a telephone scam, as telemarketers are trained to draw you in. If the offer seems too good to be true, it most likely is. You should be suspicious of a call if:

- The caller claims to be working for a company that has a name intended to sound like a government agency or a well-known company;
- The caller says you must act on the offer the same day;
- The caller is unwilling to send you written information about the offer;
- The caller asks you for a credit card number or your Social Security number; or
- You have to pay a fee before you receive complimentary services.

Telemarketing scams can range from bogus vacation awards to charity appeals. Fraudulent promoters have access to telephone directories, mailing lists and other resources to target potential victims. In New York, you can use the Do Not Call Registry to stop unwanted calls. To be added to the Do Not Call Registry, call 888-382-1222.

Identity theft poses the same financial risk as telemarketing scams. Victims are often left with damaged credit reports and are forced to spend money to repair the damage caused. Identity theft can happen when someone steals a credit or debit card number, or obtains a Social Security number or any piece of personal information. The thief can then use this information to purchase items or open new accounts in your name.

You can prevent identity theft by:

- Avoiding carrying your Social Security card, birth certificate or passport in your purse or wallet and never keeping your ATM pin number on your card;
- Never giving out your credit card number over the phone unless you initiated the call and trust the business;
- Being careful when disclosing personal information online like passwords and Social Security numbers. Check website links to make sure they are legitimate before typing in your information; and
- Using passwords on your credit cards, bank and phone accounts. Never use easily available information such as birthdays or the last four digits of your Social Security number for passwords.

If your identity is stolen it's important to immediately contact the fraud department at each of the three major credit bureaus and freeze your credit reports; this can prevent thieves from taking out new loans in your name. It's also important to close the fraudulent accounts, file a police report and obtain a copy for our records. And don't forget, you are entitled to a free copy of your credit report from each credit reporting agency once a year.
