Housing

Coming to an agreement on a housing package that prioritized development of affordable units while simultaneously protecting existing tenants was my number one priority in this year's budget. Earlier this week, I shared an overview of the housing package that was approved by the Legislature; you can read that full statement here.

Stopping Retail Theft

In recent years, retail theft has become a major concern for all citizens. It's critical that we guarantee that New York is not only a safe place to live, work, and commute, but also to shop. The Assembly has passed a number of measures to address the public safety concerns around retail theft, including categorizing assault on a retail worker as a class E felony; creating a new crime of fostering the sale of stolen goods online in order to combat stolen goods crime rings; allowing prosecutors to charge thieves with grand larceny from separate thefts; and creating a tax credit for small businesses to cover retail theft expenses and security. These

steps will stem the tide of retail crime that we've seen in recent years, and make New York safer for everyone, particularly the workers who operate the stores we rely on.

Sammy's Law

After many years of tireless advocacy, Sammy's Law has finally passed as part of this year's budget. <u>Sammy Cohen Eckstein was a 12-year-old boy who was killed by a driver in</u> <u>Brooklyn in 2013.</u> Since his tragic death, his mother, Amy Cohen, transformed her grief into action by championing this legislation that would have saved her son's life. Sammy's Law changes the state law that had previously restricted New York City from lowering its speed limits. The consequence of this law is that the city can lower its speed limit from 25 to 20 MPH, which will help to slow traffic and make our streets safer for all New Yorkers. Keeping the street safe for pedestrians, bikers, and drivers alike is one of my top priorities in Albany, and I have been a vocal supporter of Sammy's Law. I am thrilled that it has finally passed, and I have so much appreciation for Amy and the advocates who worked so hard to make this life-saving bill a reality.

Increasing Bus Service for New Yorkers

The budget allocates an additional \$12 million to increase bus frequency and reliability ahead of the implementation of congestion pricing.

Healthcare

One of the victories in this year's budget that I'm proudest of is on behalf of the more than half a million people in New York State who rely on insulin every day. This life-saving medication will no longer be subject to copays or any cost sharing requirements, increasing its accessibility and ensuring the health of so many people who have struggled to afford it.

The budget makes critical investments in health care services including \$800 million in funding for financially distressed and safety-net hospitals and \$350 million in funding for hospital rate increases. The spending plan includes \$31.1 million to fund critical programs to help individuals involved in the criminal justice system and diagnosed with a mental illness get the care and services they need.

Environmental Funding

The enacted budget invests \$2.5 billion in funding for the environment, including \$400 million for the New York State Environmental Protection Fund (EPF). It also allocates \$500 million to support New York State's clean water infrastructure.

Education Funding

The enacted budget includes \$35.9 Billion in school aid to the General Support for Public Schools (GSPS), which includes \$24.9 billion in Foundation Aid, a \$934.5 million increase over the previous year. It is crucial that we address the effects that the pandemic has had on our children's education, and this funding will ensure that schools can instruct kids and

prepare them for their futures. The budget also reinstates the "Hold Harmless" provision within Foundation Aid, which keeps school districts from receiving a cut in Foundation Aid.

The Assembly's budget also includes (but is not limited to):

- An additional \$1.5 million in funding for Schools for the Blind and Deaf (4201 schools), for a total of \$113.4 million;
- \$14.3 million to restore funding for Teacher Resource and Computer Training Centers;
- \$1 million for the State School Immunization Program

Mayoral Control Proposal

The budget will also extend mayoral control of the New York City School District for two years, until June 30, 2026. Further, the budget will increase the Panel for Education Policy (PEP) from 23 members to 24 members to include one independent voting member, who will serve as chair of the PEP for a one-year term. The mayor will be required to select this member from a pool of three nominees: one by the speaker of the Assembly, one by the temporary president of the Senate, and one by the chancellor of the Board of Regents.

Illegal Cannabis Shops

I have been working closely with my colleagues around the city and state to devise a solution to the proliferation of illegal cannabis shops that are breaking the law and targeting kids with their products. We must do everything we can to help the legal market flourish, and a critical part of that is to crack down on the illegal shops that are rapidly multiplying in our streets. To combat the illegal shops, OCM can now issue an order to immediately padlock a store with an egregious violation and any other store on a second violation. Egregious violations include:

- Documented sale to minors;
- Unlicensed processing of cannabis;
- Violent behavior toward investigators;
- Reports of hospitalization due to consumption of products;
- Close proximity to houses of worship, schools or public youth facilities; and
- Sales of cannabis that has not been lawfully tested.

In addition, the sheriff's office will have the authority to conduct regulatory inspections of cannabis shops and will have the power to require landlords to take action to remove the occupant within five days. If they do not, a fine of five times the rent charged or \$50,000 will be issued. These measures are key to curb the illegal market and I look forward to the improvements that enforcement will provide.

Hate Crimes

This year's budget modernizes the New York State hate crimes law by including 31 new offenses as eligible for hate crimes. They include gang assault, certain sex crimes, human trafficking, graffiti, false reporting, and criminal possession of a weapon. I was proud to join my colleagues Senator Brad Hoylman-Sigal and Assemblymember Grace Lee in pushing for this change. It is essential that those who commit such horrendous crimes are prosecuted to the fullest extent of the law, and this change will guarantee prosecutors can pursue criminals exhaustively.

Funding Secured

I led a number of funding initiatives to help our district and the state and I'm proud to have secured the following in this year's budget:

- **\$450,000 for New Alternatives for Children's Healthy@Home program** which serves low-income families with children who have medically complex needs by providing health services at home and avoiding long term or permanent hospitalization.
- **\$400,000 for LiveOn NY** to support their New York State Rights and Information for Senior Empowerment (RISE) Program which connects older adults with information on critical resources available to help them make ends meet, remain in their homes, and thrive in life.
- **\$180,000 for GMHC** to fund HIV and STI testing, linkage to care programs and to help provide supportive housing services to clients with histories of chronic homelessness.
- **\$100,000 for Covenant House** in Hell's Kitchen to support their legal services department, youth trafficking prevention programs and youth mental health services.
- **\$2,000,000 for the Joyce Theater** to fund their expansion allowing for greater educational and programming opportunities.

I'm proud that this year's budget is investing in the local community of District 75, and I'll keep fighting for investments in my neighbors every day!
