INCREASING THE MINIMUM WAGE

This month the Assembly passed a bill to increase the minimum wage in New York. With this new legislation, the minimum wage would increase to \$9.00 per hour starting in January 2014 and index the minimum wage to inflation beginning in 2015. This is an important victory for working families in Queens.

RALLYING FOR PAID SICK LEAVE

I joined Congresswomen Carolyn Maloney and Nydia Velazquez, State Senator Liz Krueger,
Assemblywomen Aravella Simotas, Gabriela Rosa and Linda Rosenthal and Council Members Gale Brewer,

PASSING AN ON-TIME BUDGET



I hosted a participatory budget breakfast with Senator Toby Stavisky and Assemblyman Ron Kim at the Flushing Town Hall to hear from community members and organizations. Dozens gathered to voice their concerns and engage in a productive dialogue on how the state budget would impact Eastern Queens, including local schools, community organizations, and other public services. With the increased demand for infrastructure upgrades and innovative programming to serve growing youth,

senior, and immigrant communities, many participants raised concerns about funding cuts to education, small businesses and social services. This forum provided an opportunity for our community to come together and think of creative ways we can advocate for local needs throughout this year's budget process.
