CRIME PREVENTION TIPS



At home

- Consider installing a peephole or digital security viewer.
- Don't hide keys outside.
- Keep doors and your garage closed and locked during the day, even if you're home or only leaving for a few minutes.
- Put deadbolt locks on all exterior doors.
- Always ask visitors (including repair and delivery people, as well as police officers) to identify themselves before opening the door. You have the right to refuse to open the door.
- If a stranger asks to come in to use your phone, offer to make the call instead. Never let a stranger enter your home.
- Inside and outside lights offer protection. Keep entrances well-lit, and leave some inside lights on at night.

When driving

- Approach your car with the key in hand. Look around and inside the car before getting in.
- When practical, travel on well-lit, populated streets. Keep windows closed and doors locked.
- Put your purse in the glove compartment or on the floor.
- Keep your car in gear at traffic lights and stop signs. If your safety is threatened, honk the horn and drive away as soon as possible.
- If you think you're being followed, don't pull into your driveway or park on a deserted street. Pull over to the curb where there are people, and let the car pass you. If the car still follows you, drive to the nearest place for help – a gas station or police station – or use your cellphone to call the police.
- If you are followed into your driveway at night, stay in your car with the doors locked until you know the driver's intent. Sound the horn to get the attention of neighbors or to scare the other driver off.
- If someone drives you home, ask the driver to wait until you're safely inside your home before leaving.
- When parking at night, choose a place that is well-lit. Check for loiterers before leaving the car and look inside the car when returning to it.
- Never leave the car keys in the ignition, even if you only park for a short time. Lock the car and take the keys with you.



In the community

- Travel with a companion if possible, especially after dark.
- Be aware of your surroundings.
- After exiting a vehicle at night, look to see whether you are being followed.
- If you see someone suspicious, cross the street. If you feel you are being followed, don't be afraid to run. If you see a house with lights on, knock on the door and ask for help.
- Maintain a secure grip on your purse. Place one end of the purse in the palm of your hand and the other in the bend of the elbow, holding the purse firmly against your body. If someone tries to snatch it, let it go. It's replaceable.
- Walk in the middle of the sidewalk and avoid passing close to shrubbery, dark doorways, parked cars and other concealed places.
- Avoid shortcuts, especially through backyards, schoolyards, parking lots and alleyways.
- Only carry as much money as you need.
- Don't use an ATM on the street or behind a building.

- When using public transportation, sit close to the driver. Stay alert and don't doze.
- If you'll be arriving home after dark, leave a light on near the door you will use. Have your key ready so you can open the door immediately.
- If you notice a door or window was forced open or broken while you were out, do not enter your home. Use a cellphone or neighbor's phone immediately to call police and wait outside until they arrive.

When you're away

- Using timers to turn on interior and exterior lights will keep your home illuminated and help it appear occupied even when you are away.
- Arrange for someone to do maintenance, like cutting grass or shoveling snow, if you are away for an extended time.
- Put a hold on mail and deliveries, or have someone collect things while you are away.
