


Fall Back to School

The Toddler Learning Center is open to young children aged from 18 – 38 months. Parents will learn about nutrition, speech development, early literacy and parenting skills, while toddlers become familiar with social environments at a young age. Kick-off to Kindergarten (K2K)

Children Ages 3-4 Years Old

To prepare children for kindergarten, K2K classes emphasize knowledge of letters and numbers, as well as promote at-home literacy and conflict analysis strategies for parents. To register, please contact any participating library.

Universal Pre-Kindergarten (UPK)

Universal Pre-Kindergarten is open to children when they become 4 years old by December 31 of the school year in which they are enrolled in the program. UPK gives children the foundations they need to succeed academically and socially once they begin elementary school.

A free afterschool program for children Ages 6-14 Years Old

STACKS was created to enhance your child's learning experiences through structured and unstructured, age-appropriate activities in a



safe and welcoming environment that helps school-aged children build their emotional, social and academic skills. STACKS operates throughout the school year (including school holidays), Monday – Friday, 3 p.m. – 5:30 p.m.

Tax Relief for Low-Income Households

aving some extra money would certainly help throughout the school year. If your gross income is \$18,000 or less and you pay \$450 or less for rent or own your own home, you may qualify for a tax credit. The amount of the credit is determined by three things: age, income and the rent (or real property taxes) you pay. You may claim credit for past years. Complete and file IT-214 before these dates:

Tax year 2016 → April 20, 2020 Tax year 2017 → April 19, 2021




Who doesn't qualify?

- The combined gross income of all members of your household is over \$18,000.
- You can be claimed as a dependent by another taxpayer.
- The residence is wholly exempt from real property taxation.
- The current market value of all real property you own (garages, houses, and land) exceeds \$85,000.
- The average monthly rent (not including heat, gas, electricity) exceeds \$450 per month.
- Part of the residence is rented and the income derived from nonresidential purposes exceeds 20 percent of the total rent.

s our young people are getting ready to graduate from high school they can now benefit (as can all eligible New Yorkers) from the new NYS voter registrations laws:


They can as a 17 year-old register to vote if they will reach their 18th birthday by the end of the calendar year.

New Yorkers can register, re-register and make address changes at many state and local offices serving the public, including the departments of Labor, Social Services and Motor Vehicles, as well as state and city universities.

New Yorkers moving anywhere within New York State will automatically have their registration transferred to the new address and the Board of Elections will send confirmation to you when it receives the address change.




Marijuana Expungement Law



New Yorkers will also be eligible to have B-level marijuana convictions wiped clean from their records. Individuals can also petition the courts to destroy their records, but this is subject to a court order.

It is my hope that this new law will ease the burden on New Yorkers, especially people of color who have been disproportionately impacted by current drug laws, who are living with a criminal record as a result of the possession of small amounts of marijuana.
