**Questioning Mayor de Blasio During the Local Governments Joint Budget Hearing**

## **Encouraging and Supporting Low-Income Entrepreneurship on Staten Island**

I was glad to join the Center for an Urban Future and the Richmond County Savings Foundation for a panel conversation to discuss the resources needed to better support first-time entrepreneurs from low-income communities on Staten Island. With unemployment rates on Staten Island at 9.4%, up from 3% a year ago, entrepreneurship and self-employment could become an increasingly important pathway for more New Yorkers to earn income and provide for their families during the road to economic recovery.

That is why I proudly secured the MTA Small Business Mentoring Program for an additional 10 years and continue to ensure more public works project opportunities went to Minority/Women-Owned Business Enterprises and Disadvantaged Business Enterprises. An economy that is more accessible to all, adds value to not only our local economy but also wellbeing of the individuals and families supported by these successful businesses. While there is more to be done on the state level, our community benefits from organizations like the Minority Women in Business Association of Staten Island, Staten Island Business Outreach Center, and the SI Chamber of commerce that help first-time and low-income entrepreneurs succeed.

## **Updates From Albany**

**Passing bill A.3022 to require the notification of new homeless shelters and public information session in the community where the proposed shelter is to be located.**

- This is a chapter amendment to legislation passed last year (**A.7820-A**) relating to community involvement in the siting of new homeless shelters in New York City.
- This legislation would revise notification and posting requirements and would require public information sessions to be held in the community district in which a new shelter is to be located.
- In 2020, the Legislature passed A.7820-A (Fall), which became Chapter 383. This chapter amendment, which is effective on **December 31, 2021**, clarifies the original legislation by revising the notification process required of the Department of Homeless Services (DHS) prior to the siting of new shelters.
- DHS is required to post the process on the DHS website and provide notification to elected officials and the community board of the applicable district and to send yearly notice electronically and physically to federal, state, and local officials requesting potential shelter locations.
- Additionally, this chapter amendment would apply to shelters more broadly and remove the limitation to adult shelters.
- Finally, instead of a public hearing, this charter amendment would require public information sessions to be held in the district in which the shelter is to be located to allow the public to ask questions and provide comments.

The intent of this bill centers on accountability and transparency when community leaders, elected officials, and residents raise public safety, environmental, transportation, and education accessibility concerns. This

amendment is not to prevent homeless shelters from opening to assist women, children, or men with housing needs. In fact, this legislation's full intent is to make sure sites are safe and habitable for those in need and to set a pathway to implementing permanent housing for those individuals and families in need.

**I co-sponsored legislation (A.970) which amends the private housing finance law, in relation to the membership of the New York state housing finance agency, the housing trust fund corporation, and the affordable housing corporation.**

- The purpose of this bill is to expand the membership of the New York State Housing Finance Agency (HFA) to include one director appointed by each house of the legislature, and to align membership of the subsidiary Housing Trust Fund Corporation (HTFC) and Affordable Housing Corporation(AHC).
- The HFA and its subsidiaries - the HTFC and AHC - are designed to increase access to affordable rental and homeownership opportunities for low- and moderate-income New Yorkers by issuing bonds and providing grants to help finance rehabilitation and construction of housing across the State.
- This bill would facilitate the expansion of membership of the HFA to include Senate and Assembly appointees and the alignment of membership of the HTFC and AHC with that of the HFA.

I decided to co-sponsor this legislation with my colleague, Assemblymember Cymbrowitz, Chair of the Assembly Housing Committee because it ensures legislative representation in the administration of these significant State resources and ensures efficient and accountable operations to bring about affordable housing to those underserved New Yorkers.

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**Critical Updates, New Policies, and Testing Locations to Protect You and Your Community**

1. Staten Island is no longer in the micro-cluster zone, meaning the 4 person per table limit at bars and restaurants can return to the standard 10 person maximum per table once indoor dining reopened, [Friday, February 12](#) at 25% capacity. COVID-19 restrictions that were announced as part of the phased reopening of the state remain in place.
2. **New Yorkers with comorbidities and underlying conditions can begin making appointments at state-run mass vaccination sites beginning February 14, with the first appointments scheduled for February 15.** Excess vaccine supply meant for hospital workers can be used to open eligibility for New Yorkers with comorbidities and underlying conditions. Local health departments will determine how, where and when to schedule appointments in their jurisdictions.
  - To show they have comorbidities or underlying conditions, New Yorkers must provide documentation as required by the facility where they are getting vaccinated which must be either a doctor's letter, medical information evidencing comorbidity, or signed certification.
3. **NYC Schools will welcome back blended learning students in grades 6-8 for in-person learning starting on Thursday, February 25. Middle school staff will return on Wednesday, February 24, to prepare for students' return.** Here are the protocols to keep schools open:
  - **Weekly Testing:** All schools will have 20% of students and staff randomly tested on a weekly basis.
  - **Student Consent:** All students are required to provide consent for testing by their first scheduled in-person learning day. Families can submit consent using NYCSA or a paper form.

- **Staff Consent:** All staff are required to provide consent by the first day they report to their school building. Staff can submit consent using the daily Health Questionnaire or using this paper form.
  - **Situation Room:** The Situation Room remains schools' main points of contact for any possible cases of COVID-19 in school buildings, and will continue to guide schools through any COVID-19 cases occurring in their buildings.
4. **Effective March 15, marriage receptions can be held under limited state guidelines.** Events must be approved by the local health department and there will be mandatory testing of all guests before an event. Capacity at weddings and receptions will be limited to no more than 150 people or no more than 50% of the venue's capacity, whichever is lower. All patrons must be tested prior to the event.

- **Eligible individuals will have to fill out a screening form and attest to being in an eligible category.** Anyone who is NOT eligible for vaccination, should not sign up for an appointment. **Click here to find updated vaccine eligibility lists, vaccine locations near you and to schedule a vaccine appointment when eligible.**

  - **The High School Application deadline is extended from Tuesday, 2/23 to Monday, 3/1.** LaGuardia registration deadline is extended for families from **Tuesday, 2/23 to Monday, 3/1.** The audition submission and internal assessment deadline is extended from **Monday, 3/1 to Monday 3/8.**
  - **The Middle School Application deadline is extended for families from Tuesday, 2/9 to Tuesday, 2/23.**
4. **The Department of Education has also launched the 2021 Citywide and Community Education Council election application**, which is held every two years. **The application process for candidates runs through February 28, and voting will take place in May.** Education Councils help shape public education in NYC schools and make a difference for their school community! For this year's election, parents of all students are eligible to vote and parents must sign up for an NYC Schools Account to run for a seat or vote in the election. **Click here to learn more.**
