Dear Friends and Neighbors,

Today I joined Carter Burden Network to cut the ribbon on a newly renovated office space, funded through my office, for its over 6,000 senior citizen clients to access critical social services in our district.

Throughout the COVID-19 pandemic, we have faced two years of physical, emotional and economic distress and uncertainty brought on by the COVID-19 pandemic. As the infection rates are steadily declining and we are beginning to feel like we can resume our normal lives, families are being burdened with rising inflation that's putting stress on our wallets and wellbeing. In the Assembly, we are doing all we can to make investments into our economy and work for policies that put more money back into the pockets of New Yorkers.

To support households across the state, we are accelerating middle-class tax cuts, expanding the child tax credit and Earned Income Tax Credit and providing \$2.2 billion in property tax relief checks. After a winter where households saw record-high energy bills, we are providing \$500 million in funding to help pay utility arrears in order to make sure families don't have to choose between paying their heating bills and buying groceries. Our budget proposal also puts critical funding into the programs that New Yorkers depend upon most. It invests in our students' education and expands access to affordable, quality child care services.

It provides a plan and funding to fight climate change to protect our environment for the future and it prioritizes community safety by putting forth important gun safety initiatives and providing integral funding to local hospitals and mental health services. The one-house budget also includes funding to help people stay in their homes because whether you rent or own a home, everyone deserves a roof over their heads. Seawright Funds \$150,000 Upgrade for "A More Welcoming Environment for Seniors" at the

#### **Carter Burden Network**

"It is with great joy and appreciation that we formally acknowledge and celebrate Assembly Member Seawright for providing capital grant funding that was instrumental in upgrading our new Carter Burden Network headquarters," said Dionne.



"The Carter Burden Network's outstanding work provides aid, comfort, and guidance to more than 6,000 senior citizens each year," said Seawright. "I'm delighted to help boost their efforts with upgraded facilities and a more welcoming environment for our seniors."

"We are so thankful for not only this grant but for all Rebecca does to support older adults in the community through the years, including hosting recent events such as COVID vaccine booster clinics and PPE supply give-away events at our centers."

The Carter Burden Network moved into the basement location at 415 East 73rd Street in 2017. The space was severely in need of renovation, but the organization did not have the funds to do the job.

Seawright's grant paid for conference rooms upgrades, a kitchenette, floor leveling, light installation, and improved heating, ventilation, and air conditioning,

Dionne said the space is now transformed into a high-functioning office for 14 staff members, including a team of social workers, finance department, and executive staff and clientele.

"Our attractive, new offices are welcoming to older New Yorkers on the Upper East Side and house our social service unit, which provides vital access to government assistance and entitlements and wraparound services," he said. "Our new headquarters supports our efforts to serve thousands of older adults, including those in our Carter Burden Luncheon Club and Roosevelt Island Older Adult Centers."

For more than fifty years, the Carter Burden Network has promoted the well-being of seniors 60 and older through a continuum of services, advocacy, arts and culture, health and wellness, and volunteer programs, all oriented to individual, family, and community needs. The organization is dedicated to supporting the efforts of older people to live safely and with dignity.

SEAWRIGHT ANNOUNCES MOBILE MUSEUM OF TOLERANCE

#### DUCATION

As incidents of hate crimes continue to mount, a mobile museum is coming to teach tolerance and combat antisemitism and other forms of discrimination, thanks to \$1.5 million grant to the Simon Wiesenthal Center, Assembly Member Rebecca Seawright announced. The state-of-the-art mobile edu-

The state-of-the-art mobile education center will use an interactive theater and other technology to teach tolerance and combat all forms of discrimination by focusing on the Holocaust as well as an American civil rights experience as critical teaching moments. Seawright joined forces with As-

Seawright joined forces with Assembly Speaker Carl Heastie and NYS Assembly Member Helene Weinstein, chair of the Assembly Ways and Means Committee, to obtain the funding to fight the rising trend of hate crime. Heastie thanked Seawright for her

Seawright said: "I commend the Speaker Heastie for his leadership in prioritizing tolerance and Holocaust education. I look forward to the Mobile Museum of Tolerance visiting the communities I represent on the Upper East Side, Yorkville and Roosevelt Island, areas that comprise the 76th Assembly District."

the 76th Assembly District." The mobile museum is modeled after the Wiesenthal Center's hugely successful "Tour for Humanity" mobile tolerance vehicles in Chicago and Toronto, which reached hundreds of schools and thousands of students annually.

The Center is a global human rights organization that confronts antisemitism, hate and terrorism and teaches the lessons of the Holocaust for future generations. It is headquartered in Los Angeles and maintains offices in New York, Toronto, Chicago, Paris, Buenos Aires and Jerusalem.

variently in the procurement phase, will allow access for tens of thousands of students, educators, law enforcement agencies, faith group and professionals to critical educational training on issues such as antisemitism, racism, bullying, stereotyping, hate and intolerance and promote diversity and human dignity.

#### Hate Crimes Increasing

Seawright said that reports of hate crimes have been steadily increasing over the past several years, citing recent NYPD statistics, some incidents hitting from close to home. "In August of 2020, my commu-

"In August of 2020, my community office was the subject of an antisemitic attack with white paint and an antisemitic note left at the door, with two more attacks subsequently on my district an campaign offices," said Seawright.

According to the NYPD, Manhattan led the city's record rise in hate crimes last year with 199 bias incidents. Brooklyn was next with 119 hate crimes, followed by Queens with 102, the Bronx with 44 and Staten Island with 17. Overall, police recorded 524 hate crimes last year, up 98% from the 260 in 2020. Incidents of bias crimes against

Incidents of bias crimes against Asians rose most out of any group with 131 cases reported in 2021 compared to 128 in 2020, an increase of 368%. Crimes against Jews continued to lead the category with 191 incidents in 2021, up 40% from 128 in 2020.

In response, Seawright is sponsoring legislation to mandate the training or counseling in hate crime prevention and education for individuals convicted of a hate crime. This legislation passed the Assembly unanimously with a vote of 145-0.

"Education and training are central to promoting tolerance and respect for others," said Seawright. "Combined with vigilant law enforcement, this is essential to keeping our communities safe. Our legislation is key to confronting the surge of hate crimes we have witnessed in our city and state."

#### A Message from the 200 East 83 Street Construction

Dear Neighbors,

On behalf of the development team, we would like to provide an update on the construction occurring at 200 East 83rd Street, at the corner of Third Avenue and East 83rd Street.

The exterior precast façade has been substantially completed and the tower crane has been dismantled and removed from the site. Installation of the mechanical infrastructure is moving up the building followed by their work on each floor in proper sequence. Interior framing and masonry activities are behind these trades, with a drywall program close behind, currently moving up through the mid-level of the building. The contractor is in progress with their finish program on the lower-level floors, now moving up towards the mid-level of the building. The elevator program is commencing on schedule.
