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Seawright Supports STAR Tax Relief for Senior Citizens

Governor Kathy Hochul announced that nearly three million New Yorkers will receive \$2.2 billion in tax relief this summer and fall through New York's School Tax Relief (STAR) program. STAR provides property tax relief to eligible homeowners and seniors statewide. While some STAR recipients have already received their benefit this year in the form of a tax exemption, many other recipients will receive their benefit as a tax credit and will be sent a check in the mail this summer and fall. Check deliveries will begin next week and will continue statewide throughout the coming months. Most homeowners eligible for a STAR credit will receive a check between \$350 and \$600. Most seniors eligible for an Enhanced STAR credit will receive a check between \$700 and \$1,500. STAR recipients can visit ny.gov/STAR to track their check delivery or enroll in direct deposit.

Assembly Member Rebecca A. Seawright said, "As Chair of the Aging Committee and Assembly Member of the largest cohort of older adults in Manhattan, I am grateful to Governor Hochul for her enduring leadership on affordability in our city and state, particularly for aging New Yorkers. The STAR and Enhanced STAR Credits provide invaluable tax relief to qualifying homeowners and elders. They also enable aging in place for elder New Yorkers—including over sixty thousand constituents in my district—which enhances their health and advances quality of life at significant taxpayer cost savings over institutionalized care. The STAR program is both compassionate and common sense."

Statement from the Office of Assembly Member Rebecca Seawright On the U.S. Supreme Court's Decision Regarding Gender-Affirming Care for Minors

In response to the recent Supreme Court decision allowing Tennessee's restrictive law on gender-affirming medical care for minors to remain in effect, Assembly Member Rebecca Seawright reaffirms her unwavering commitment to protecting the rights, dignity, and well-being of LGBTQ+ youth in New York State. Assembly Member Seawright's commitment is reflected in New York's passage of its own Equal Rights Amendment in 2024, which she proudly led as the sponsor. This amendment explicitly prohibits discrimination based on gender identity and expression.

While this ruling marks a setback for transgender rights at the federal level, it is important to emphasize that access to gender-affirming care remains protected in New York. Our state has consistently led the nation in advancing LGBTQ+ rights and continues to stand as a beacon of inclusion and equality. The Office of Assembly Member Seawright stands firmly with the transgender and nonbinary community and will continue advocating for legislation and policies that ensure access to comprehensive, affirming, and medically necessary care for all individuals, regardless of age.

We urge our constituents and community partners to remain vigilant and engaged as we work to protect these essential freedoms and support every New Yorker's right to live as their authentic self.





Seawright Cosponsors FAIR Business Practices Act Passing Both Houses




Our economic system works best when the playing field is level for workers, entrepreneurs, and consumers. Unfortunately, current state law doesn't go far enough in protecting all businesses, non-profits, and consumers from unfair, deceptive, and abusive business practices. As one of the world's largest and most dynamic economies, we must ensure that regulations targeting deceptive practices apply to everyone.

That's why Assembly Member Seawright helped pass the Fostering Affordability and Integrity through Reasonable (FAIR) Business Practices Act (A.8427-A). This law will help shield New Yorkers from harms like predatory lending, phishing scams, aggressive debt collection, data breaches, and hard-to-cancel subscriptions.

While current law only prohibits deceptive acts, the FAIR Business Practices Act expands the definition to prohibit any unfair or abusive acts, helping to close loopholes that prevented protections from such schemes. And in response to the federal government's rollback of the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau (CFPB), which protected New Yorkers from abusive business practices, the legislation also grants the state Attorney General additional enforcement powers to better protect consumers and businesses.

Vigilance and know-how remain powerful tools against unfair and unjust business practices, yet they are not enough. The FAIR Business Practices Act will strengthen New York's consumer protection laws, ensuring businesses and consumers alike are protected from bad actors.


RAISE Act Will Help Ensure Safety Protocols for Al Technology



With technology advancing at a rapid pace, we face an entirely new realm of threats that demand legislative attention and protections. In this age of continuously evolving artificial intelligence (AI), current laws and safeguards don't keep up with the major security risks the technology encompasses. The Assembly has taken several steps in recent years to ensure online safety, from protecting our children on social media platforms to combating deepfakes. In response to the growth of AI, Seawright helped pass the Responsible Artificial Intelligence Safety and Education (RAISE) Act, which will put critical safety standards in place for AI frontier models (A.6453-B).

Al has driven groundbreaking improvements throughout society, including advances in medicine, faster data analysis, and automating mundane tasks for increased efficiency. However, Al could also be used to conduct devastating cyberattacks and aid in the production of dangerous weapons. Heeding the calls of experts in the field, the RAISE Act would require that Al developers create a safety plan, reviewed by a third party, and disclose major security incidents to the state Attorney General and the Division of Homeland Security and Emergency Services. Such safety protocols are commonsense initiatives that will allow for continued technological advancements while also helping to prevent potentially devastating incidents from occurring in the future.

Legislation Removes Gas Line Subsidy, Saving Utility Consumers Money While Encouraging Green Energy




As we transition to cleaner, greener energy sources, we must find common-sense solutions to reduce our natural gas dependency and keep utilities affordable for ratepayers. That's why Assembly Member Seawright supported legislation removing the '100-foot rule' for gas utility companies, providing flexibility and savings to residential customers while reducing unnecessary gas infrastructure subsidies (A.8888).

Under current law, the cost of the first 100 feet of gas line for new customers is divided among existing customers. This means we're all footing the bill for hundreds of millions of dollars in new gas hookups each year. Additionally, these subsidized connections continue our natural gas dependence instead of encouraging more sustainable solutions. Gas used for heating, hot water, and cooking is responsible for roughly a third of New York's greenhouse gas emissions. Under this bill, new hookups would still be permitted, but the customer requesting it would be required to pay for the new line themselves instead of having it subsidized by everyone else.

This legislation is an effective way to help millions of New Yorkers keep more of their hard-earned money while putting alternative energy solutions on an even footing. Together, we can ensure a cleaner, safer future for our state and our planet.

Spotlight on Aging: Senior Job Seekers

How can I find a job as a Senior Citizen? The NYC Department for the Aging has a variety of Older Adult Workforce Programs to help you with just that! The Older Adult Employment Program, Silver Stars, and Foster Grandparent Program are intended to assist older adults in finding employment.

Older Adult Employment Program: In this program, participants have the opportunity to take classes on vital workforce skills and are assigned an internship at a City or nonprofit agency. Throughout the program, participants will be able to attend job fairs and workshops. If you are a NYC resident 55 or above, have a family income of no more than 125% of the national poverty level, and are currently unemployed, you may be eligible to participate in this program. Email jobs@aging.nyc.gov with questions.

Silver Stars program: The Silver Stars is a program that helps NYC retirees find income through part-time job opportunities at City agencies. Job positions within this program are typically 15-29 hours a week, with wages dependent on the individual agency and the scope of the job. If you are a City resident aged 55 or above and are currently unemployed or retired, you may be eligible to participate in this program. Visit the ReServe website (reserveinc.org) to learn more about the Silver Stars.

Foster Grandparent Program: If you are interested in helping special-needs children ages 3-12 years old with social, emotional, and academic skills, this is the

program for you! While the program is considered a volunteer program, you receive a stipend (\$4.00/hour) while you volunteer and attend training and orientation events and will be reimbursed for meals and transportation. If you are a NYC resident aged 55 or older, meet income eligibility requirements, and are willing to volunteer a minimum of 15 hours per week, you are eligible for this program. At GoodCauseNYC.org, a brand-new website, NYC tenants can enter their address and answer a short set of questions to determine if their apartment unit is eligible for protections, and access resources to fight back against an unjust rent hike or lease nonrenewal. The site also includes a rent increase calculator to help renters determine if their rent hike is considered "unreasonable" by the law.

The Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP) can cover the cost of fans and air conditioners for eligible New Yorkers. To find out if you qualify, visit: otda.ny.gov/programs/heap/#cooling-assistance.

Empire State Child Credit

The New York State Department of Taxation and Finance is issuing supplemental Empire State Child Credit payments to over 1.5 million low- and moderate-income New Yorkers. The 2024–2025 New York State budget provides for an additional payment to eligible taxpayers based on the Empire State child credit. If you qualify for a payment, you don't need to do anything; we will automatically calculate and send you a check for the amount you're entitled to. Energy Affordability Programs

The NYS Energy Affordability Program provides income-eligible consumers with a discount on their monthly electric and/or gas bills. You may be enrolled automatically if you receive benefits from a government assistance program. 
