As of Friday evening we are in the process of passing the final FY 2024-25 State Budget. Next week I will provide an update on the adopted budget, but I can report several priority issues I fought for that will result in benefits to the Sound Shore and Westchester communities.

These priorities include key funding additions for state aid to school districts, clean water grant funding, flood mitigation, college tuition financial aid programs, restorations to many health care programs, childcare funding, and support for 4201 schools, including New York School for the Deaf based in Westchester. There is positive news in many other budget categories as well as disappointments on various issues where we will continue the fight.

Last week I enjoyed experiencing the eclipse with residents and staff at the Osborn senior community in Rye and at the boardwalk at Playland Amusement Park. It was great to see the eclipse but also great to share the moment with others marveling at this special event.

On the boardwalk, I spent some of the time with active community volunteer Brian Jackson (Rye Lions Club and Rye Chamber of Commerce), who visits the boardwalk every morning to photograph the daily sunrise. On this day, he had all the equipment to take amazing photographs of the eclipse. I share this beautiful image in which Brian incorporated one of Playland's historic towers with a special moment of the eclipse.

Laptop Distribution with the STEM Alliance and the Carver Center

Recently I shared in the excitement of the distribution of 60 new Chromebooks to high school students at the <u>Carver Center</u> in Port Chester at the conclusion of a digital inclusion program through a partnership with <u>The STEM Alliance</u> and Carver.

Digital inclusion programs provide affordable broadband access, a training course, and a device to individuals in need of digital literacy assistance. Each teenager received a new Chromebook during the event, giving these students an opportunity to expand their academic and personal growth through digital skills. Device ownership - not loanership - is associated with becoming a fluent tech adopter who can master a wide range of requisite skills in our digitally driven world.

It was very exciting to meet and share the excitement of program participants as they received their new laptops. I was joined at the distribution by STEM Alliance and Carver Center staff, Carver Center Chief Executive Officer Anne Bradner, and Port Chester Mayor Luis Marino.

I am the leading proponent of digital inclusion programs in the state legislature where I advocate for statewide programs to support these services that address what is known as the digital divide, the inequities that leave students and adults at a disadvantage when it comes to education, health care, employment, and the countless other parts of our lives that require digital access.

These programs are best provided through partnerships between groups like The STEM Alliance and community organizations that help individuals who need these services. Over the past two years, the partnership between The STEM Alliance and Carver Center has been instrumental in providing STEM education and fostering digital equity among students and adults.

Daniel Bonnet, Carver Center's Chief Program Officer, expressed gratitude for the partnership, stating, "Providing Chromebooks to our Teen Center members and participants is a valuable investment in their future. It equips them with essential skills, expands their educational opportunities, fosters creativity and innovation, and promotes social connection and personal growth. By empowering teens with access to technology, you are helping to shape confident, capable, and digitally literate individuals who are ready to thrive in the modern world. It is one step closer in closing the digital divide in our community!"

This distribution was made possible through a \$90,000 grant I sponsored through the Office of Children and Family Services to provide these programs through the STEM Alliance with community groups on the Sound Shore. To date I have funded grants that have provided 19 of these programs to 350 individuals with the following local partners: <u>New Rochelle YMCA</u>, <u>Community Resource Center</u> in Mamaroneck, <u>Don Bosco Community Center</u> in Port Chester, <u>Open Door Community Health Center</u>, <u>La Plaza de Paulo</u> in Port Chester, and the Carver Center. Additional grant funds are in the pipeline to provide more programs and laptops to those needing devices and training.

In Albany I work with a statewide network of groups providing digital equity programs and a national group advancing this model across the country. Digital inclusion programs are an effective tool in successfully addressing structural inequities in society. I am thrilled to work with and advocate for the technology groups and local not-for-profits that partner to provide these programs.

EMS Issues Will be a Key Focus for this Legislative Session

Not included in the state budget was a package of state legislation to reform EMS services, organizational structures, and access to funding throughout the state. I am the Assembly lead sponsor with Senator Shelley Mayer of the Essential Services legislation, which is one of the leading bills in the package. We were hopeful the issue could be addressed in the state budget. More work is needed to resolve outstanding issues and we are determined to do everything we can to move the package of bills before the end of the legislative session. I am pictured below at an Albany press conference earlier this year organized by Firefighter groups. The EMS reform bills are a priority for Fire Service, local government, and EMS groups throughout the state. In recent years, we have won changes in prior legislative sessions through working with reforms under the jurisdiction of state agencies. The next level of reforms requires legislative action this year.

Tom has been one of the most respected library directors in Westchester and is retiring after decades of service as a library leader.
