Five Islands Park Hosts Day of Marine Science on the Sound for New Rochelle Students

In late July I visited an exciting student program, a partnership between the New Rochelle Youth Board Eco-Ambassadors program and the Energy Justice Law and Policy Center to provide students with exposure to environmental issues and STEM learning in the community. The program is supported by a \$100,000 grant from the Long Island Sound Community Impact Fund and Restoring America's Estuaries with the goal of increasing access for all to the Long Island Sound while promoting environmental stewardship through hands-on education and community engagement.

The program employs New Rochelle High School students to assist in science-based programing. On the day of my visit, 150 middle schoolers from Mercy University's STEM program participated in a series of coastal science activities at Five Islands Park. The day featured the exciting opportunity to observe the students launch a camera-equipped Remote Operated Vehicle (ROV) into the water at the park. We were able to view the underwater life via video screens in

the park.

The Eco-Ambassadors assisted the middle school students in various hands-on science activities, including identifying organisms, drawing nature, making observations, beach clean-up and operating the ROV.

As Chair of the Assembly Committee on Science and Technology, I have been an advocate for STEM education in the schools. Mercy University and the New Rochelle City School District both support this mission.

Mamaroneck Traffic Safety: A Major Focus this Summer

A major priority this summer has been discussions regarding efforts to address the next steps needed to improve traffic and pedestrian safety around Mamaroneck Avenue School, the Village of Mamaroneck, and surrounding communities.

Following the tragic deaths of Molly Murphey Donovan and her son Michael "Mikey" Donovan Volpe, Senator Shelley Mayer and I have had numerous conversations with village, county, and state officials about traffic and pedestrian safety issues in the village. We both attended the Village Trustees' meeting on July 8th and were able to hear first-hand of the many comments that were made by concerned parents and their children about how critically important it is that we all redouble our efforts to improve safety in all parts of our lives.

We have spoken to the village and Westchester County regarding long and short-term improvements to the Mamaroneck Avenue corridor, which is a county road. We have also been in touch with the NYS Thruway Authority regarding pedestrian safety improvements at the I-95 Intersections on Mamaroneck Avenue.

Earlier this year, Senator Mayer and I had already been in discussion with parents, school officials, and municipal leaders in the villages of Mamaroneck and Larchmont, and the town of Mamaroneck, as part of the upcoming reconstruction of Route 1, the Boston Post Road, covering the three jurisdictions. The NYS DOT has a major repaving project for all of Route 1, a state road, within the village of Mamaroneck, town of Mamaroneck, and village

of Larchmont, which has yet to be fully designed. There will be an open and full public participation process conducted by NYS DOT to work with the three municipalities, two school districts, and the public regarding traffic and pedestrian safety measures as part of the Route 1 design.

Mamaroneck's experience in implementing 2017 improvements on the Boston Post Road in the vicinity of Mamaroneck High School is a good guide for added safety improvements today. We were part of a broad coalition of Safe Route to Schools parents, municipal and school officials, and NYS DOT to implement a new School Speed Zone on the Boston Post Road between the Mamaroneck Town Center and Richbell Road.

This kind of collaboration is a model for new discussions on the larger Boston Post Road corridor. I will continue to make this work a major priority. Through numerous ongoing discussions, Senator Mayer and I have maintained and enhanced communication among all the key officials with the local governments, school districts, state and county officials, and law enforcement with the goal of implementing improvements to better protect pedestrians, drivers, and students. We will continue to make sure that pedestrian and traffic safety improvements are brought to the forefront in all of these discussions and are implemented in coordination with the local officials involved.

Drinking Water Treatment Plant Groundbreaking



On Tuesday I attended the groundbreaking for construction of the Indian Brook Water Treatment Plant serving the town and village of Ossining. The \$100 million project is being funded through a variety of sources including the Mid-Hudson Momentum Fund, the Green Innovation Grant Program (GIGP), and the Water Infrastructure Improvement Act (WIIA) grant program that I helped initiate in 2015.

I continue to be a major advocate for the clean water programs across the state. The GIGP and WIIA programs are administered by the NYS Environmental Facilities Corporation. The Mid-Hudson Momentum Fund is managed by Empire State Development. State funding is vital in making clean water infrastructure projects affordable for local governments and taxpayers. Communities across the Sound Shore have been aggressive at securing funding for projects in Southern Westchester. The Westchester Joint Water Works was recently awarded \$30 million in WIIA funding for their Rye Lake Water Filtration Plant.

I was joined at the groundbreaking event by numerous local officials, municipal staff, and engineers who designed the project. Those in attendance included Assembly colleague Dana Levenberg, Former Village of Ossining Mayor Victoria Gearity, Town of Ossining Supervisor Elizabeth Feldman, Village of Ossining Mayor Rika Levin, Westchester Deputy County Executive Ken Jenkins, and State Senator Peter Harckham.
