The second year, I participated in the annual Converge Conference sponsored by the Westchester County Association, The STEM Alliance, and Westchester County. Titled "The Hudson Valley Digital Innovation Conference: Transforming Business in the Age of Al and Quantum Computing", the Converge Conference again brought technology companies, academics, government officials, and not-for-profit leaders together to discuss cutting-edge issues in technology and society.

The keynote speaker was John E. Kolb, Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute's Vice President and Head of RPI Future Computing Institute (FOCI). RPI has an IBM Quantum computer on their campus and has entered a new partnership with Westchester County.

The subject of my panel was "Policy & Protection – Regulating Telecom and Al for the Public Good", which provided a good discussion of developments in Al policy in New York and around the country. New York has attracted microchip manufacturing companies and launched the Empire Al Consortium to use Al for the public good. The engaging panel ensured a good discussion. # Governor Hochul Announces One-Stop-Shop for Military, Veterans, and Family Members Interested in SUNY

Governor Hochul has announced the launch of a one-stop-shop for active duty service members, veterans, and family members currently enrolled or interested in attending any SUNY college or university. The landing page: <a href="www.suny.edu/military">www.suny.edu/military</a>, includes information on available credit for military service and experience, tuition assistance, specialized scholarships, and dedicated campus services like veteran lounges and associations for all 64 SUNY campuses. The website also connects veterans with services offered by the counties where each campus is located, helping them stay close to home and community, and will be regularly updated as new information becomes available.

Also <u>recently announced</u> is expanded access to an affordable education through the Veterans Tuition Assistance Program, which went into effect on July 1. The program will now serve even more veterans by broadening eligibility and increasing flexibility.

Thirty-seven SUNY campuses offer academic credit for military service and experience, and the new website includes connecting visitors to an easy-to-use search for available credit for military experience and training. Additionally, SUNY campuses have tailored support available including student veteran associations and military and veteran offices, and counties throughout New York State have programs and staff available as well. SUNY developed this comprehensive website so that service members and veterans would be able to easily learn about and access all of the available programs and benefits that they have earned through their service.

## Next Phase of STAR Tax Relief Going to Millions of New Yorkers This Summer and Fall

Governor Hochul announced the start of phase two of the School Tax Relief (STAR) program benefit season. Eligible homeowners in communities with school tax due dates in August or September will start receiving their STAR benefit in the coming weeks. Most homeowners eligible for a STAR credit will receive a check between \$350 and \$600. Most seniors eligible for an Enhanced STAR credit will receive a check between \$700 and \$1,500. STAR recipients can visit <a href="ny.gov/STAR">ny.gov/STAR</a> to track their check delivery or enroll in direct deposit.

The STAR program provides property tax relief to eligible New York State homeowners. During STAR benefit season, which runs from June to November, nearly three million homeowners will receive more than \$2.2 billion in property tax relief through the program.

Homeowners who are eligible and enrolled in the STAR program receive their benefit each year in one of two ways: as an exemption that reduces their school tax bill, or as a credit issued as a check or direct deposit.

Those who receive the STAR credit as a check or direct deposit can visit the <u>STAR</u> <u>Credit Delivery Schedule</u> to learn when credits will be issued in their area. Property owners who are looking for details about STAR credits that have already been issued should visit the <u>Property Tax Credit Lookup</u>.

#### **Enroll in STAR Direct Deposit**

Homeowners can enroll in the <u>STAR Credit Direct Deposit</u> program through the <u>Homeowner Benefit Portal</u> within the Tax Department's secure Online Services system. Homeowners can also use the Homeowner Benefit Portal to manage their STAR benefits easily and efficiently.

#### **Upcoming Westchester County Household Recycling Days**

Scheduled Events on October 4 and November 8

Westchester County's Department of Environmental Facilities (WCDEF) will host two upcoming Household Recycling Day events, offering residents convenient and safe opportunities to dispose of household waste. The Household Recycling Day (HRD) events will be on:

- Saturday, October 4, from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. at Sprain Ridge Park, 149
   Jackson Ave., Yonkers
- Saturday, November 8, from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. at Playland Park, 1
   Playland Pkwy., Rye

Due to the popularity of the events, residents may experience extended wait times. Those who wish to avoid long lines, or cannot attend an event, are encouraged to schedule an appointment at the County's Household Material

Recovery Facility (H-MRF), and located at 15 Woods Road on the Grasslands Campus in Valhalla. The H-MRF accepts the same items as HRDs and is open year-round, Tuesday through Saturday, 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. For more information or to schedule an appointment, CLICK HERE or call (914) 813-5425.

In addition to properly labeled household chemicals, tires, scrap metal, electronics, appliances, and other special wastes found in a typical household, residents can bring documents for shredding and expired or unwanted medications for disposal to the HRD Events. Residents should place items in their trunk or backseat and remain in their vehicles while staff unload vehicles in the drop-off area.

Generally, the following items are accepted for safe disposal or recycling:

- Properly labelled household chemicals, such as:
  - Household cleaning products, most automotive fluids (antifreeze, brake fluid, gasoline, but not motor oil), flammable liquids (kerosene, butane, lighter fluid, turpentine)
  - Metal, jewelry, and furniture polishes and waxes; wood preservatives
  - o Fertilizers, pesticides, insecticides, herbicides
  - o Photographic and swimming pool chemicals
- Batteries only vehicle, rechargeable, or button cell
- Textiles- footwear, clothing, linens, leather, and handbags
- Latex and oil-based Paint, wood stains
- Fluorescent light bulbs & CFLs
- Fire extinguishers
- BBQ propane tanks (up to 20 lbs.)
- Mercury containing devices (thermometers and thermostats)
- Electronic waste (TVs, computer monitors and towers)
- Expired or unwanted medications, both OTC and prescription

- Personal documents for shredding (limit of four (4) file-size boxes per household.
- Tires (with or without rims) up to four per household

Items that will not be accepted and should not be brought to the Household Recycling Day include non-rechargeable alkaline and carbon-zinc batteries (they can be safely discarded in the trash), motor oil, smoke detectors, cell phones, explosives (flares, fireworks, ammunition), construction debris and hypodermic needles. Please note that waste from businesses, schools, or other institutions will not be accepted.
