Dear Friends,

We are in the thick of the NYS 2024-25 budget, which starts on April 1. After reviewing the Governor's budget proposal, each house of the Legislature develops a response, known as the "One-House Budget."

I am pleased that both the Senate and the Assembly One-House Budgets address key issues I have been advocating for throughout the budget process. Our next step is to work with our Senate colleagues and then negotiate a final budget with the Executive Branch. I am optimistic that the process will result in a strong and responsible budget.

Meanwhile, I am also continuing to work on legislation and would like to take this opportunity to detail some of the bills I have introduced.

So let's dive right in!

Assembly One-House Budget

The Assembly proposal provides a fiscally prudent financial plan for the state while addressing critical needs for our communities. These include:

Restoration of Funding for Education

Under the Assembly proposal, the Governor's proposed cuts to education funding – which were met with bipartisan opposition – are restored. State school aid would total \$36.4 billion, an increase of \$1.1 billion over the Governor's proposal and \$1.8 billion over the 2023-2024 state budget.

Fixing Our Roads

The Assembly proposal would appropriate \$16.2 billion, an increase of \$1 billion over the Governor's proposal. The proposal includes \$4.9 billion for the State Road and Bridge Program, an increase of \$400 million over the Governor's proposal. It would also provide \$1.5 billion for capital aid for local roads, an increase of \$250 million over the Governor's proposal.

Environmental Protection

The Assembly proposal would appropriate \$2.5 billion to the Department of Environmental Conservation, an increase of \$250 million over the Governor's proposal, which includes \$400 million for the Environmental Protection Fund (which, among other things, provides critical grant funding to municipalities).

The proposal also restores \$250 million in funding (for a total of \$500 million) for clean water infrastructure, also critical to our localities.

Mental Health Peer-to-Peer Program

I was pleased that a bill I sponsored – which would require the Office of Mental Health to establish a statewide grant program to develop peer-to-peer mental health programs for professional and volunteer emergency first responders – is included in the Assembly proposal. Sadly, first responders are at an increased risk for mental illnesses such as depression and post-traumatic stress disorder. Instituting the support program created by this bill is essential to the well-being and mental health of those who protect us.



I recently joined the Firefighters Association of the State of New York (FASNY) at a press conference to highlight a package of legislative proposals to support firefighters and other emergency responders. Included in the package is a bill that I am sponsoring to establish a peer-to-peer mental health support program for emergency responders.

Capping Co-Pays on Life-Saving Epinephrine

The Assembly proposal would amend the Governor's proposal to cap co-pays for insulin by adding to it a requirement that insurers provide coverage for epinephrine auto-injector devices.

AAPI Funding

The Assembly budget restores \$30 million in funding for Asian American and Pacific Islander (AAPI) crisis intervention centers and community-based organizations combatting biased crimes.

Protecting Our Disability Community

The Assembly provides over \$200 million to restore proposed cuts in Medicaid's Consumer Directed Personal Assistance Program (CDPAP), providing for wage parity. These cuts would further destabilize critical care for seniors with Alzheimer's disease and dementia, adults with severe developmental and neurological disabilities, people with traumatic brain injury, and those who are unable to communicate because they are nonverbal or face language barriers. I will be fighting to ensure these funds are in the final version of the budget.



Speaking at a recent event with Westchester Disabled on the Move, 199SEIU, Westchester colleagues in the Legislature, and members of the disability community who would be hurt by the Executive's proposed budget cuts in Medicaid's Consumer Directed Personal Assistance Program (CDPAP). These funds are restored in the Assembly's One-House Budget.

Additionally, the Assembly's budget proposal protects New Yorkers' healthcare from cuts and provides a responsible and balanced housing package that protects existing tenants, while also providing reasonable incentives to developers.

Again, our next step is to work with our Senate colleagues and then negotiate the final budget with the Governor and her team.

My Proposed Legislation

I am also continuing to press ahead with my sponsored legislation, which addresses many of my key priorities. Among the legislation I have introduced:

The Environment

[A09330](#) Requires home sellers and vendors to provide information regarding septic system upkeep to ensure that new homeowners are properly educated on how to care for their septic system, allowing them to protect both themselves and the environment.

[A09260](#) Directs the DEC to establish a perfluoroalkyl and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS) removal treatment installation grant program, providing a one-time grant to private well users for the installation of PFAS treatment or service connection to a public water system; directs the DEC to establish a PFAS removal treatment maintenance rebate program, providing a rebate to private well users for the maintenance of PFAS treatment equipment.

People with Disabilities

[A06397](#) Establishes a task force under the NYS Department of Labor, in consultation with the Governor's Chief Disability Officer and the Department of Health, to promote the employment in state agencies of people with disabilities.

[A08373](#) The "Traveling with Dignity Act" would provide for height-adjustable adult changing tables and facilities to be placed at public roadside rest areas, museums, libraries, buildings, and amusement attractions, and made available for persons with disabilities, veterans, seniors, or other individuals, for the purposes of personal hygiene.



[Senator Pete Harckham](#) and I announced our new legislation, the Traveling with Dignity Act, at a recent press conference with colleagues and advocates.

[A09131](#) Directs the New York State Department of Labor to establish a voluntary training and certification program for employers that have taken the Neurodiversity Training Pledge to support an inclusive workplace and the advantages of a neurodiverse workforce. The program would promote techniques to train the employer's workforce and promote the hiring of neurodiverse individuals.

Part-Time Police

[A05846](#) A number of smaller police departments in Westchester County are staffed largely by part-time police officers, many of whom are retired police officers who would be subject to suspended or reduced retirement benefits should their part-time earnings exceed a certain level. This bill would provide relief to these localities (which often have difficulty in recruitment and retention), provided the retired officers do not exceed a certain number of hours worked.

Veterans

[A0547](#) Creates a voluntary purple star schools program under the NYS Education Department, to recognize schools and school districts that demonstrate a commitment to assisting military-connected students and their families. The Department of Defense recommends states help schools to make assessments so that critical information is easily accessible to military-connected students, military families, school and school district faculty, and staff.


LGBTQ+

[A08241](#) Requires municipalities to update physical and online forms and data systems to include a gender "X" option. New York driver's licenses and U.S. passports now offer an 'X' gender marker alongside 'F' and 'M,' and this bill extends this inclusivity to local municipal governments. Allowing individuals to choose a gender marker that aligns with their identity promotes inclusivity, respect, and accurate record-keeping.

I will be working hard to pass each and every one of these pieces of legislation, and I will keep you apprised of my progress.


