Legislative highlights

01. Lead Sponsor

A07537: The Consumer Utility Protections During Investigations Act, or (CUPDI), suspends late fees and service terminations for nonpayment while the utility is being investigated. Currently, two such investigations are ongoing: Central Hudson and NYSEG.

Requires customers to be notified within 3 days of an investigation starting, ensures utilities don't pass costs incurred as a result of this legislation to ratepayers, and makes ratepayers entitled to treble damages for improper shutoffs and fees.

02. Cosponsor

A00295B: Lowers the fixed charges on utility bills—these are the flat charges that are not dependent on energy use

A00295B: Prohibits utilities from using ratepayer money to make political contributions



03. Passed and needs to be signed by the Governor:

A4055A: Bans utilities from backbilling, i.e. sending bills for services rendered two months prior

A03683: Requires the Public Service Commission (PSC) to issue a final determination for utility rate related complaints within 90 days

A7165: Provides funding for residential and small business utility customers to become active participants in rate cases, which is the process where a utility asks for a rate increase

The Build Public Renewables Act!

The first "Green New Deal" legislation to pass in the country, with the strongest labor protections for the renewable sector to date!

01. What does this bill do?

Authorizes and directs the New York Power Authority (NYPA)—the country's largest publicly-owned energy provider —to build enough affordable renewable energy to meet our climate goals.

Provides automatic discounts for lowincome disadvantaged communities, which will be paid for by NYPA's sale of publicly-owned renewable energy. **Our district has several such communities, including in New Paltz, Saugerties, Port Ewen, Kingston, and more.**

02. Has it gone into effect?

Yes! But the public still needs to organize to ensure this bill is implemented as intended, and that NYPA brings opaque processes out in the open for public engagement. **Get in touch if you want to get involved**!

03. Why is this legislation necessary?

The private sector has been coming up short on its output of renewable energy. The total share of wind and solar in the state's energy production has been only about 6%.

For years, NYPA has been banned from building new energy, leaving new renewables entirely to the inefficient and expensive private sector.

The recent series of extreme weather events makes it clear: the climate crisis is here. But as we transition off fossil fuel, we must also ensure affordability and protect workers who need to transition into the new sector.
