Medication Sync Legislation

Did you know that over 50% of medications are not taken properly at all? Better yet do you know that government plans such as Medicare Part D strive to reach a goal of patients taking medications with an adherence rate of 80% yet often times patients do not meet those goals? Worse yet, we all know that we have a very expensive health care system with poor outcomes which is in part due to what is mentioned above – poor medication adherence.

Well, the good news is that the Governor has the ability in the coming weeks to help correct that issue by signing two bills into law that were passed by the Assembly and Senate to help patients with adherence. They are collectively called the Medication Sync bills however there are two bills listed here for your review. The bills below are intended for pharmacists and prescribers to work with patients so that they can have their prescriptions filled all at one time per month. The goal is to make sure patients do not go without medications especially since access to pharmacies, especially for the ill and elderly is becoming more of an issue as pharmacies, chain and independent, are closing throughout the country.

12/22/2019	Ch. 399 of 2019	<u>A.569</u> <u>S.2714</u>	Provides that local social services districts provide information to kinship caregivers about child-only grants, becoming a kinship foster parent and other options for care, as well as contact information for the Department of Family Assistance and other local resources.
12/28/2019	Ch. 227 of 2019	A.7906A S.5692A	Provides for restricted clinical laboratory licenses for individuals employed in a Department of Health authorized toxicology laboratory.

Robocall Prevention Legislation
