

Enhancing community hubs

- Secured \$250,000 for Hudson Falls to purchase the former Washington County Courthouse so that the historic building could be renovated to serve as a community center.
- Committed \$250,000 to the Hudson River Music Hall to aid in the restoration of the Strand Theater with ongoing roof repairs.

Supporting local veterans

Assemblywoman Woerner helped secure \$5,500 for Hudson Falls American Legion Post 574 to renovate the kitchen at its facility. She always stands ready to support the brave men and women who have honorably served our nation.

Boosting public safety

Assemblywoman Woerner will always place the health and safety of Kingsbury and Hudson Falls families first. To enhance local public safety, she sponsored and passed a law that helps ensure the Village of Hudson Falls has the police officers needed to protect residents (Ch. 122 of 2018).

Improving pedestrian access

Ensuring a community is safe and pedestrian-friendly plays an important role in economic development and enhances residents' quality of life. Assemblywoman Woerner supported these efforts in the Village of Hudson Falls by providing \$50,000 in multi-modal funding for sidewalks that will be installed at the intersection of Route 4 and Court Street.

Supporting New Yorkers in recovery

Note: To ensure the legitimacs and integrity of each project, grants are subject to oversight from the Division of Budget, Attorney General and State Comptroller. Allocations are made on an ongoing basis.

To help residents struggling with substance use disorders, Assemblywoman Woerner secured \$12,500 for The Council for Prevention to help sustain outreach, programming and education for individuals in recovery in Washington and Warren counties, as well as to train new recovery coaches. The Council's outreach includes both on- and off-site activities, meeting, and recovery coaching directly targeting individuals and their families who are in the midst of recovery.
