Recent weather notwithstanding, I am seeing the first budding hints that spring is around the corner, and I am excited to enter this season of growth and change. We are nearing the final stretch of the State budget process and I am seizing every opportunity I get to fight for our district.

State Budget

One-House Budget Summary

The State Assembly has released its one-house budget, which is a response to the Governor's budget proposal. This counter-proposal will be reconciled between the Assembly, Senate and the Executive Department in the coming weeks, and I am proud that a number of my bills and supported issues that I've fought hard for were included in the final negotiations. Some of these are:

\$10M for Volunteer Fire Services Capital Fund

 This funding will be used for vital upgrades to firehouses to comply with federal health and safety codes.

Part of A3690 to increase Corp Tax Rate

- •This provision from my bill, A3690, represents the first step towards a more progressive and equitable tax scheme. I will continue to advocate for common sense corporate tax rates, under which the richest and least vulnerable pay their fair share, to be included in the final State Budget.
- \$25M for Harmful Algal Bloom (HABs) Research

 This research will allow for better prevention and management of toxic HABs in our state's freshwater and coastal ecosystems.

My SBIR/STTR Bill (A4507a)

- •This is a matching grant program to provide funds to small businesses who have been awarded funds under the federal Small Business Innovation Research or Small Business Technology Transfer programs and provide a grant preference for small businesses that make green and sustainable development a business priority.
- Agrivoltaics program (In the Senate one house)
 - •\$1 million for Cornell to study the ecological impacts of agrivoltaics, the dual-use of land for agriculture and solar energy farming.
- \$15M for Cornell Veterinary Diagnostic Laboratory Capital Expansion

I will continue to push for the inclusion of my bills and championed legislation in the State budget, and will keep you updated as this process goes on.

Legislative Update

A2873a Passes the Assembly!

This week, the Assembly passed a package of legislation designed to bring greater transparency, accountability and accessibility to state government. I'm proud that my bill, **A2873-A** was included in this package. This bill will close the loophole on cryptocurrency assets on the state's annual financial disclosure statement, which will bring transparency to individuals' interests in digital financial property. EPW Hearing Testimony -3/7/23

On Tuesday, March 7th, I testified in the US Senate Committee on Environment & Public Works (EPW) hearing before the Clean Air, Climate, and Nuclear Safety Subcommittee in support of the Crypto-Asset Environmental Transparency Act.

This act, introduced by Senator Edward J. Markey, would require that the EPA conduct a comprehensive impact study of U.S. crypto mining activity and report greenhouse gas emissions from operations that require more than 5 megawatts of power.

If we don't have transparency, we can't have an honest conversation about the impact of crypto-mining on our environment.
