Dear Neighbors,

The last few weeks have been a whirlwind in the final push before the finalization of the State Budget. I've been devoting my time heavily to supporting and fighting for initiatives, programs and policy that will benefit our state and our local communities. This is a tremendously busy but invigorating time of year!

#### **Combating Misinformation about Bail Reform**

I want to give a shout out and a big thank you to Tompkins County District Attorney Matt Van Houten for his <u>compelling and powerful op-</u> <u>ed</u> outlining fact over fiction for bail reform.

As he notes in his article, state data shows that bail reform is successful in doing the very thing it sets out to do – reducing re-arrest rates of people committing crimes. Although there has been an increase in crime nationally over the last couple of years, the increase in crime in New York State has been lower than national average. Bail reform may have been a contributing factor to this success.

I am deeply dedicated to public safety and particularly committed to countering identified causes of crime including lack of access to affordable housing, jobs, transportation, mental health support and substance use treatment and prevention – factors which were exacerbated during the pandemic.

## Legislative Update

#### **Challenging Wrongful Convictions**

New York State currently ranks third in the nation for wrongful convictions. Facing an inordinately long pre-trial period or offered a reduced sentence in return for a guilty plea, thousands of New Yorkers have been coerced into accepting guilt in cases where they were completely innocent.

To ensure innocent New Yorkers are able to pursue justice, I helped pass legislation that will allow for post-conviction reviews of claims in cases that went to trial or were resolved in a plea, as well as remove stringent legal barriers for people to challenge convictions based on false or faulty evidence (A2878, Aubry). Additionally, it allows those who were convicted of a crime that has since been decriminalized to have their records cleared, such as those arrested for possession of marijuana. Since 1989, more than 330 innocent New Yorkers have been exonerated, and we must do everything we can to ensure every wrongful conviction is corrected.



#### **Increased Access to Contraception**

On Tuesday, March 28th the Assembly passed legislation that will increase access to self-administered hormonal contraceptives by allowing pharmacists to execute a non-patient specific order from a licensed physician or certified nurse practitioner (A1060, Paulin).

I voted in favor of this legislation and remain a fervent supporter of giving people the information and choices they need to make the best healthcare and family planning decisions for themselves. You can watch a <u>video of my remarks here</u>.

# Anna in the News

#### Fighting for Fair Pay for Home Care Workers

This week I raised my voice in support of home care workers and the need to fairly compensate them for the vital services they provide. We cannot expect to address staff shortages in home care in this state if we don't invest into this crucial workforce!



#### **Calling for Volunteer Fire Service Funding**

I want to do everything I can to promote and improve my district's emergency service resources. One of the priorities I called for in the state budget is securing stable funding for volunteer fire services so that stations like Cortland Fire Department can get the facility upgrades they need to better serve our communities. #### Supporting Affordable Housing and Renter Protections

Earlier this week I attended an event in support of the Governor's Housing Compact. Our decades-long housing shortage is hurting all New Yorkers, especially working-class New Yorkers and people of color.

We need a comprehensive approach to building new affordable housing at the state level. My bills, <u>A4933</u> (The Sustainable Affordable Housing and Sprawl Prevention Act) and <u>A3111</u> (Affordable Housing Appeals Process), will expand affordable housing access for all New Yorkers. <u>You can see a video of my speech at the event here.</u>

I also attended a rally to support <u>A4454</u> (Hunter), prohibiting eviction without good cause.



#### Working to Protect Car Shares

An important factor in a greener, more economically just future means giving people better transportation options. Car shares are an environmentally conscious, community-centric transportation choice allowing greater freedom and flexibility for those who cannot or choose to not own personal vehicles. Unfortunately, nonprofit car shares are at risk of being shut down this spring as they face an impossible situation when securing affordable car insurance. I seek to combat that with my bill A5178. <u>Here is a video of my remarks</u>.

#### World Water Day

We commemorated World Water Day by passing a resolution proclaiming March 22 as Water Day in New York State. In celebration of this resolution I want to share <u>an op-ed</u> that I wrote in January with NYC Council Member Sandy Nurse about the connection between waste management and our drinking water. We must take action to curb the expansion of massive landfills like Seneca Meadows Inc, which release PFAS – forever chemicals – into our environment, threatening the health and safety of the state's water supply.

#### Ithaca Board of Realtors Annual Legislative Luncheon

Housing is a vital part of the state budget and a critical issue in Ithaca where demand is surging. I was happy to talk to my district's realtors (like Carol Bushberg) at the Ithaca Board of Realtors Annual Legislative Luncheon on Friday. We discussed issues like local housing, good cause eviction, the NY Housing Compact, and climate action plans.



#### **Remembering Irene Stein**

On the last day of Women's History Month, I want to honor a woman who defies singular description. Words cannot do justice in describing Irene Stein, who passed this week at age 92. Irene came up during an era that didn't routinely see women achieve Master's degrees and PhDs, become Director of the County Office of the Aging, let alone become a powerful and historic institution as Chair of Tompkins County Democratic Committee for more than 30 years. She was a founder and leader of the Democratic Rural Caucus, ensuring Upstate NY had a powerful voice in Albany. Over several decades Irene moved the needle as an agent of societal change by lifting up those privileged to walk and work alongside her. She fought fiercely for what she knew to be right, and against what she knew to be wrong. Irene Stein will be missed and cherished, most of all by her children and grandchildren. Irene's impact is immeasurable, shaping past, current, and future generations.
