Dear Neighbors,

It has been a busy and exciting week! I enjoyed the opportunity to connect with several municipal leaders and community stakeholders in Tompkins County at in-district events, which I share more information about below. Negotiations also continued with the Governor's team around the Carshare bill, and I am hopeful that I will be able to bring you an update this week.



Water Health Experience on Cayuga Lake with District Leaders

I had the pleasure of hosting, along with Senator Lea Webb and Senator Rachel May, Tompkins County municipal leaders and local water health experts for an informative afternoon exploring Cayuga Lake and its ecosystem. Aboard the Discover Cayuga Lake boat, we experienced the "floating classroom" with hands-on activities led by Bill Foster and crew. Cayuga Lake and its watershed is vitally important as a source of freshwater in the region. Leaders in our district were able profoundly, and viscerally, to experience Cayuga Lake's impact on the communities surrounding it, and truly understand that the health of the lake and its watershed is inextricably connected to the health and well-being of all the people in our district. The lake serves as the primary drinking water source for at least 40,000 residents. The watershed spans parts of 6 counties (Cayuga, Tompkins, Seneca, Schuyler, Tioga and Cortland) and is impacted by the needs of agriculture, industry and tourism. In the face of climate change, lake health is threatened. As leaders, we all need to be ambassadors for the lake, working together to educate our community and advocating for policies and funding that will protect this natural resource for generations to come.



Presentation on Forever Chemicals



Following the boat tour, we gathered at Ithaca Farmers Market for a presentation by Dr. Roxanne Razavi, Assistant Professor of Environmental Biology at SUNY College of Environmental Science and Forestry (ESF), on per- and polyfluoroakyl chemicals (PFAS or "forever chemicals"). Dr. Razavi guided participants through what PFAS are, how they present in our water, and their impact on our health. Senator May and I sponsor the PFAS Discharge Disclosure Act (A3296 /S227B) which would require all permitted facilities discharging waste in the state to disclose the measurement of PFAS chemicals found in any discharges. We look forward to our bill advancing in the legislature in the upcoming session.



Housing Round Table Discussion

I joined Sen. Rachel May for a housing roundtable in Ithaca as we discussed the challenges of housing for New Yorkers with key stakeholders in the district, including Unity House, INHS, Human Services Coalition, CNY Fair Housing, Housing Visions, senior staff from Sen. Lea Webb's team, and the City of Ithaca. Affordability and availability of quality housing remain primary concerns. In addition to expanding housing stock, particularly affordable housing, we also need to address the social factors that impact homelessness, as well as the recruitment and retention of staff in supportive housing. I appreciate the insights shared by all participants during this informative discussion, and I look forward to applying these insights as we address housing issues in our legislative session.



Community Resources

Discrimination Financial Assistance Program for Farmers

During U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Tom Vilsack's excellent presentation at Cornell, I was very pleased that he took time to mention that The Inflation

Reduction Act (IRA) includes funding (from section 22007) to provide financial reparations to farmers, ranchers and forest landowners who experienced discrimination from the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) farm lending program prior to January 1, 2021. Impacted farmers can <u>learn more about the assistance program</u>, review the <u>eligibility</u> requirements, and <u>file an application</u>.



New York Forward Loan Fund 2

Our state would not be what it is without small businesses. To retain and grow our small business sector, businesses and nonprofits with fewer than 100 employees are eligible to apply for the <u>New York Forward Loan</u>, a loan of up to \$150,000 with competitive, fixed interest rates. Loan funds can help businesses invest in capital improvements or equipment as well as cover payroll, utilities and rent, supplies, and advertising.

2nd annual Emergency Preparedness & Safety Fair on Saturday, September 16th from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. at the Shops at Ithaca Mall. The event is being held in conjunction with National Preparedness Month, observed each September to raise awareness about the importance of preparing for disasters and emergencies that could happen at any time, with this year's focus on the well-being of older adults. Local agencies and organizations, along with local police, fire and EMS departments, will share information as well as host CPR and first aid demonstrations.
