The Governor and the Legislature are tasked with not only being stewards of taxpayer funds but also enacting tax policy to ensure a fair tax structure and to generate the necessary revenue to address the needs of our State. We are still at work in the final days of negotiation (yes, they are still ongoing), and I am continuing to fight for healthcare and wellness, education, labor rights, housing, the environment and more. Each moment matters! Over the next few weeks, I will be sharing the results of these deliberations to help shed light on the final outcome of this long process!

Legislative Update

Advocating for Governor Hochul to Sign CO2 Fracking Ban into Law

I joined Senator Lea Webb, Dr. Sandra Steingraber, and environmental advocates from Frack Action and the Sierra Club to <u>deliver a letter</u> to Governor Hochul signed by 115 organizations advocating to swiftly sign the carbon dioxide fracking ban bill (<u>A8866/S8357</u>) into law. Both the Assembly and Senate passed the bills in record time with bipartisan support. The

legislation is simple and prevents the gas industry from circumventing the state's existing ban on fracking by using a highly experimental carbon dioxide medium instead of water to frack for methane gas. No matter what substance is used to extract gas and oil using the fracking process, it is still fracking for oil and gas. It will still have severe negative health and environmental consequences exacerbated by the use of a highly corrosive substance that is known to cause pipeline ruptures and destabilization through acidification and demineralization of the very ground under our feet. This bill is closing a loophole in our state's fracking ban to protect our people, our environment, and our economy, and I look forward to the Governor quickly signing the bill into law.



NYS Textile Legislation Workshop in the Workshops Event



I had the pleasure of being the keynote presenter at the NYS Textile
Legislation Workshop in the Workshops event this week in New York City which focused on two bills that I am championing: the Fashion Act (A4333) and the Extender Producer Responsibility (EPR) for Textiles bill (A8078). The day was an opportunity to engage with brands, retailers, and textile industry professionals to break down the structure of the bills and the impact that they will have on the industry and all stakeholders. We discussed the potential to create new industries as well as significantly reduce greenhouse gas emissions globally and water pollution, and reduce child and slave labor globally. It was an incredibly engaged group with hours of questions about the legislative process and progress of the bills.

I, along with many of my legislative colleagues, have been advocating for extender producer responsibility (EPR) for product packaging (<u>A5322B</u>), but we need to view all products in a similar way, including textiles. EPR is an approach that holds manufacturers and producers responsible for the life

cycle of their products, including post-consumer disposal. EPR programs shift the financial costs of disposing of such products from municipalities onto the manufacturers and producers, while incentivizing the manufacturers to design products that are easier to reuse, recycle or dispose of safely. According to the Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC), almost 1.4 billion pounds of clothing and textiles are discarded every year in New York State, about 69 pounds per resident, and it is one of the fastest growing waste streams. As our landfills continue to fill up and have limited years of additional capacity, we need to ensure that the majority of these materials are reused or recycled, which would also provide social, environmental and economic benefits.



Rally for Solidarity with Immigrants

We are currently witnessing alarming anti-immigrant and racist rhetoric as well as harmful attacks against our immigrant communities in NY. I joined a rally with legislative colleagues and organizations to advocate for a strong legislative package that would ensure greater protections and opportunities for our immigrant communities to integrate into our communities, with safety and economic engagement as core priorities. The "New York for All Act," the "Dignity Not Detention Act," and the "Access to Representation Act" are not just pieces of legislation; they are beacons of hope, ensuring that every individual is treated with respect and afforded their inherent rights. We know many immigrant New Yorkers and their families carry the anxiety of possibly having their family split up simply from living their daily lives in the open interacting with the government, attending school, going to work, or visiting a public hospital for care. The New York for All Act would reduce these concerns by broadly prohibiting state and local officers from enforcing federal immigration laws, funneling people into ICE custody, and sharing sensitive information with federal immigration authorities. As a state, New York has the power to create a physical and psychologically safer environment for all immigrant New Yorkers. Watch a video of my comments from the rally.

Recent Rainfall, Rising Water Levels and Canal Management

Significant rainfall throughout the region recently is impacting the water level of Cayuga Lake. New York State Canal Corporation has been monitoring the water levels closely, and on Sunday, April 14 activated its High Flow Management Plan for the Oswego River Basin in Central NY.

The Canal Corporation stated, "Some localized areas along the Canal system may experience seasonally and sustained high water levels during this time. As one of many water managers across the Oswego River Basin, the Canal Corporation is managing its infrastructure in a way that most efficiently moves water through the Canal system given current conditions and forecasted precipitation. The Canal Corporation is also monitoring and taking into account the Clyde River and other tributaries that contribute to the high water levels when making operational decisions."

Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) Week of Action

The White House and the U.S. Department of Education have announced a FAFSA Week of Action for April 15-19 to encourage more students and families to complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid. Did you know that last year, NY high school students left over \$200 million in federal aid unclaimed by not filling out the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA)? The FAFSA is free, and opens the door to federal and state aid and other scholarships to help pay for college. However, this spring FAFSA

completion rates are down more than 30% compared to this time last year. Upcoming virtual assistance events and on demand services can be found on the NYS Higher Education Services Corporation (HESC) website. Students who do not meet U.S. residency requirements for FAFSA may be eligible for New York's Tuition Assistance Program (TAP) through the DREAM Act.



Am I Eligible for Benefits?

As budgets are stretched to pay for housing, food and utilities, it may be helpful to see if you would qualify for assistance if you are not already receiving benefits. The New York State myBenefits website has a prescreening tool that provides a quick and easy way for people who live in NY to find out if they are eligible to receive help with buying food (SNAP or WIC), home energy assistance (HEAP), special tax credits, or health insurance. The pre-screening will take approximately 10 minutes to complete, and the information is private and secure.
