The COVID-19 vaccine is safe.

- COVID-19 vaccines are mRNA vaccines, meaning they don't use a live virus.
- The vaccine does not interact with our DNA in any way.
- It's possible that you may feel a little under the weather after getting a COVID-19 vaccine – that's a normal immune response and a sign that the vaccine is working.

Assemblymember Pamela J. Hunter: Get the facts on the COVID-19 Vaccine

The COVID-19 vaccine went through the same approval process as other vaccines.

- The vaccines were approved by the U.S. FDA and CDC, as well as New York's independent COVID-19 Clinical Advisory Task Force.
- The two currently approved vaccines used very large and diverse sample groups that showed these vaccines are up to 95% effective at preventing COVID-19.

The COVID-19 vaccine is being distributed fairly and is available to all New Yorkers at no cost.

- New York State is conducting vaccine distribution in a fair and equitable way, which includes reaching out to underserved communities, such as our seniors.
- Vaccine information is private and not shared with federal law enforcement agencies.
