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During this budget process, along with my colleagues in the New York State Assembly, I fought to restore some funding to key areas of the budget which directly affect residents' quality of life.

The 2011-2012 budget erases a \$10 billion deficit without raising taxes or incurring new debt. It brings spending to realistic levels supportable by economic growth, and it reduces the rate of growth in state spending and reduces out-year deficits by 86 percent over the next three years, virtually eliminating the state's structural deficit. It also calls for a 10 percent reduction in general fund operational costs. The \$132.9 billion budget is a 3.7 billion decrease

from last year.

Education – I fought for restorations to soften the sharp cuts to education because our future economic growth depends on good public schools. We owe our children the best possible opportunities, which is why I supported a two year appropriation for school aid that provides for at least an \$800 million increase in next year's budget. The final 2011-2012 budget increases education funding by \$272 million over the executive budget proposal. The

restorations include \$230 million for general support to public schools, bringing the total to \$19.6 billion in the 2011-12 school year.

EPIC – Even in periods of economic strength, it is difficult for older New Yorkers on fixed incomes to make ends meet. In the aftermath of the economic downturn, it is especially important to make sure that seniors can afford to put food on the table and get the medicines they need. Providing premium assistance for lower income seniors preserves this vital life line for the thousands who depend on it. I helped ensure that the 2011-12 state budget restored \$22.3 million – a 65 % restoration – for lower income Elderly Pharmaceutical Insurance Coverage participants' Medicare Part D premiums. Participants who were formerly in the comprehensive coverage portion of EPIC will continue to receive assistance in paying their Medicare Part D premiums.

Low-Cost Power – A long-term, low-cost power program is well overdue. Recharge New York is a sustainable and predictable energy program for businesses and not-for-profits designed to protect and create jobs and encourage new capital investments. The Power for Jobs program, which started in 1997, was only meant to be temporary. This new permanent solution will allow for strategic planning for local business owners and for those looking to relocate to our state, assuring them that low-cost energy won't just disappear.

Jobs – The 2011-12 budget strengthens the Excelsior Jobs program by enhancing tax credits and improving the program's responsiveness. Making our state more business friendly will attract new jobs and new capital to our state. This budget extends the program's tax benefit period from 5 to 10 years and provides a jobs tax credit equal to the product of gross wages paid and 6.85 percent. Over the next decade, the program will double, which will give businesses the stability they need and provide \$2.5 billion in total relief.

I am happy to have worked towards constructing this final budget which cuts state spending by more than \$3 billion over last year and closes the state's \$10 billion deficit, while restoring vital programs and focusing on job creation. William H. Magnaulli


