• Assemblyman Magnarelli took a tour of the Landmark Theatre's newly renovated stagehouse. Assemblyman Magnarelli was instrumental in securing funding to make this long-awaited Stage House Expansion project a reality. It involved the demolition of the existing backstage area and reconstruction of a new larger stage house that can now accommodate a greater variety of performance activities. The project has transformed the Landmark Theatre into the premiere performing arts center in our region. Its new stateof-the-art facilities will attract a variety of shows and provide a diverse array of entertainment options for the Central New York community and theatre goers throughout the Northeast. The long-awaited dream of touring Broadway becomes a reality in October with a three week run – 24 shows –of the Tony award winning musical Jersey Boys. The Theatre anticipates receiving 400,000 patrons through the doors each

year with an economic impact to the community of approximately \$25 million annually.

• A ssemblyman Magnarelli greeted members of the Northeast Community Center at the Center on June 29th. He secured funding for the center to buy a van to transport seniors to services in the community, doctor's appointments, and field trips with the center. In requesting the van, the Northeast Community Center stated, "critical enhancements to the senior program at the community center were needed. Foremost will be a new van to ensure that elderly neighborhood residents will be able to participate in the senior activities offered at the community center and that they continue to have access to key services in the community. For reasons of health, infirmity, safety or economics, many seniors no longer have their own vehicle for transportation and the lack of mobility can erode their ability to live independently in the community."

Assemblyman Bill Magnarelli said, "The more I can help our seniors enjoy a quality of life where they are independent, can enjoy social interaction and at the same time get access to quality healthcare, I will lend my support."

Founded in 1978, the Syracuse Northeast Community Center addresses a wide range of social, youth development, economic, recreational, educational, health, senior independent living, and crisis intervention needs of area residents and their families. Its programs and services span the entire age spectrum from elementary students to teens, adults and senior citizens.

The Bond Building, which sits at the intersection of Walton and South Clinton Streets, is part of the Pike Block Project, a \$25 million project designed to bring new residential and retail space to Downtown Syracuse. When the project is finished next year, four historic buildings in the heart of downtown will feature 78



residential units and 25,000 square feet of retail space. The Pike Block Project will provide a new pedestrian connection from Salina Street to Armory Square. The Assemblyman helped secure grants for the project.

• Assemblyman Magnarelli attended and spoke at the event celebrating the revitalization of the Kasson Apartments and Leavenworth Apartments on June 26.

The Kasson Apartments, located at 622 James St., and the Leavenworth Apartments, located at 615 James St., will be renovated by the real estate development and management company, Conifer, to feature 65 market rate apartments and 18 apartments for low to moderate income families. When completed, Kasson will feature one-bedroom and two-bedroom apartments available at market value with rent set at about \$800 to \$1,000 per month. The building will also feature six two-bedroom units for lower income families with rent set at \$681 per month. The project will be completed in 2013.
