WANT TO GO TO COLLEGE FOR FREE? CHECK THIS OUT!

Choosing a college major can be an intimidating process. Students entering higher education today have a vast selection of colleges and majors to choose from, but they face the decision knowing they are likely to take on burdensome student debt to finance their futures. For students who love to solve problems, want to make the world a better place and constantly wonder about how things work, a career in a Science, Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM) field can be an attractive option.

This is especially true because many of the best-paying, most secure jobs are STEM-related, and these opportunities continue to multiply. In New York State, STEM jobs are expected to grow 14 percent between 2014 and 2024, while other jobs will grow just 9 percent. Yet employers struggle to fill these positions because there are more jobs than there are workers qualified to do them, which hurts our state's businesses.

To solve this mismatch, New York State created an exciting new scholarship program for high-achieving high school students. Under the New York State Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics Incentive Program, students in the top 10 percent of their graduating classes who plan to study STEM at a SUNY school can earn full-tuition scholarships for four – or five-year programs. In return, those students must keep their grades up and work and live in the state for five consecutive years after graduation in a STEM-related field. Not only will this scholarship help inspire more students to enroll in STEM majors, it also keeps them from being saddled with crushing student loan debt upon graduation.

This incentive program is a win-win for employers searching for top talent and for high school students interested in pursuing rewarding STEM careers. By offering scholarships to our best and brightest, we're helping put more kids on the path to a brighter future and investing in the future of our state. It's vital to New York State's success that STEM-education professionals connect with the employers who need their unique talents. A strong economic future in New York State depends on preparing students for the jobs of today and tomorrow as well as encouraging graduates to stay and put down roots. Ultimately, their talents will benefit all of us.


region of the country."

The George H. Lowe Center for Justice

Assemblyman Bill Magnarelli attended the dedication of the George H. Lowe Center for Justice, combining under "One Roof", Legal Services of Central New York, the Legal Aid Society of Mid-New York, and the Volunteer Lawyers Project of Onondaga County.

In his remarks to the distinguished crowd in attendance, Assemblyman Magnarelli spoke about Judge Lowe being a major force in the "One Roof" concept for providing free legal services to low-income people in one place to make it easier to help those who would otherwise not have access to justice. Magnarelli also mentioned that the NYS Assembly recognized that civil legal services are an essential social safety net for the most vulnerable of our state's population and has always been supportive during the budget process in advocating for adequate state funding to help bridge the gap between the need and the availability of civil legal services for low-income New York Yorkers.

Judge Lowe's involvement in providing free legal services for low-income people extends throughout the state. He is a former co-chair of the New York State Bar Association Committee on Access to Justice and member of the Chief Judge's Task Force to Expand Access to Civil legal Services. He is also a founding member of the new permanent Commission on Access to Justice.
