Legislative Lane

Peoples-Stokes' Bills Already Signed Into Law

- A1177 Extends for one-year provisions of law providing flexibility in the sale of municipal obligations by Erie County. [Chapter 135 of the Laws of 2025]
- A1675 Clarifies a provision of law related to former names and aliases within the Department of Corrections and Community Supervision's electronic record-keeping applications. [Chapter 62 of the Laws of 2025]
- A2734 Extends for one-year provisions of law providing flexibility in the sale of municipal obligations by the City of Buffalo. [Chapter 149 of the Laws of 2025]
- A3009C, PartTT (BUDGET) Authorizes the City of Buffalo to impose an occupancy tax of up to three percent per room per night. [Chapter 59 of the Laws of 2025]
- A3006C, Part JJ (BUDGET) Established the City of Buffalo Parking Authority and provides for its powers, duties, and obligations. [Chapter 56 of the Laws of 2025]

Peoples-Stokes' Bills That Passed Both Houses

- All95A Requires that health insurance policies provide coverage for follow-up screening or diagnostic services for lung cancer; and that no patient cost sharing shall be imposed for such follow-up screening or diagnostic services for lung cancer. [Awaiting delivery to Governor]
- **A4759A** Improves and streamlines the medical cannabis program for patients, practitioners, and registered organizations. **[Awaiting delivery to Governor]**
- A7613B Provides alternative pathways to become certified as a certified public accountant by updating the education requirements for people who want to become CPAs. [Awaiting delivery to Governor]
- A7617 Removes the prohibition on patient participation in multiple organ transplant programs in New York State. [Awaiting delivery to Governor]

- A7753 Extends for two-years Erie County's authority to impose additional rates of sales and compensating use taxes. [Awaiting delivery to Governor]
- A7861 Provides police officers employed at Erie County Medical Center to elect to transfer into a new, twenty-five-year retirement plan. [Awaiting delivery to Governor]
- **A8289** Strengthens the authority of Indian nations to protect their lands from unauthorized occupation, illegal dumping, criminal enterprises, including drug trafficking, and unpermitted business operations, and formalizes state-tribal cooperation in criminal law enforcement. [Awaiting delivery to Governor]

Other Significant Legislation Passed by the Legislature

The enacted State Budget will improve educational outcomes and school experiences by providing universal free meals for all students and establishing a "bell to bell" restriction of smartphones or other internetenabled personal devices in K-I2 schools across the state.

The enacted State Budget included \$8 billion to eliminate the Unemployment Trust Fund debt which will alleviate payments for thousands of small businesses and raise unemployment insurance payments for workers.

The Legislature passed the Responsible Artificial Intelligence Safety and Education (RAISE) Act, which will put critical safety standards in place for artificial intelligence frontier models, including creating a safety plan to prevent severe risks and disclosing major security incidents. [A6453-B/S6953-B,Awaiting delivery to Governor]

The Legislature passed an omnibus bill to make a series of changes to New York's corrections system, improving safety for incarcerated individuals, and promoting transparency and accountability. [A8871/S8415 – Awaiting delivery to Governor]

Development Drive

Regan Development plans to demolish the former Voelker's Bowling Alley at 47 E. Amherst St. and erect a three-story 134-unit apartment building called Amherst Commons Apartments. The \$26 million project would feature a 139,281-square-foot building with 91 one-bedroom, 34 two-bedroom and nine three-bedroom units. Twenty units are reserved for households earning 50% of the area median income, while 99 are for households at 60% AMI. The project also includes supportive housing units, with support from Community Services for Every1.

Playter Gardens at the Market includes redevelopment of 37 vacant City owned parcels on Playter Street between Paderewski Drive and Broadway in and adjacent to the Broadway-Fillmore Historic District. The project will result in 73 new residential units in a mix of 2- to 3-story single-family dwellings, four, six and eight unit stacked dwellings, and a 33-unit stacked dwelling for a total of 11 buildings. The units will be affordable for those whose income are at or below 50-60% of AMI as well as provide support services for youth 18-25 years old that have aged out of foster care and are at risk of homelessness. The main building will house support services and amenities for the residents

which include a community room adjacent to a community park, a fitness room, computer and game room.

On July 1st, the newly rebuilt **Perry Homes Complex** welcomed its first tenants. 27 vacant buildings were demolished over one year ago to make way for new development on the property. With a \$225 million investment from the state, 405 new units are being built. Affordable housing continues to be an issue the state is finding solutions for.

The Salvation Army of Buffalo held a groundbreaking for the redevelopment of its three-acre campus along Main Street in Allentown in early March 2025. The kickoff celebration for the Hope on Main Emergency Family Shelter is the first of the three-phase, \$100 million project.

The development will include a seven-story 147-unit apartment building that will include studio, one-bedroom and two-bedroom units with the ground floor of the seven-story building consisting of common areas and amenities for the residents as well as program and administrative space for The Salvation Army. 2,238 sq.ft. of commercial space is proposed at the north end of the apartment building.

The emergency shelter will be comprised of 32 units for the 80 beds, and the ground floor will house program spaces to support the shelter residents along Main Street (phase 1).

The Salvation Army will also construct 16 two-story townhouses along North Pearl Street. The townhouse units, gathered in groups of 3-4 units, provide a residential scale along North Pearl Street and the Allentown neighborhood. All of the townhomes are three-bedroom units.

The Hope on Main Phase II and III includes:

- The construction of 143 one- and two-bedroom permanent affordable housing apartments for families on Main Street with wrap-around services on the first floor, and 17 three-bedroom townhomes for larger families in need on North Pearl.
- The construction of the East Buffalo Salvation Army Church and Community Center, which will be home to a chapel, offices, an after-school program, summer camps, a youth mentoring program, gymnasium, fitness center, client choice food pantry, a kitchen, dining areas, and a music program.
- And the establishment of an operations endowment to ensure the sustainability of the Hope on Main projects for years to come.

BCAT Buffalo Center for Arts and Technology has a two-fold mission and offers two high quality, tuition-free programs under one roof: The Youth Arts Program (YAP) and the Adult Workforce Program (AWP).


BCAT serves approximately 120 youth during the school year and approximately 50 more during the summer 6-week session. BCAT youth attend the free program daily from 3pm-6pm and may select from classes in sound engineering, theater, hip-hop dance, music, photography, visual arts or digital media.

The Adult Workforce Program delivers on BCAT's mission by addressing the training and life skill needs of those who have lost their way and are looking for new careers. BCAT offers nine-month courses to become either a Pharmacy Technician, Medical Coder, Sterile Processing Technician or

Phlebotomist. Both Sterile Processing and Phlebotomy are their two newest programs, put into place to address the needs of those 18–24-year-olds who do not go directly to college and are looking for a path into the healthcare field. Adult Day Program students are in classes from 9am-3pm daily and must complete a 6-week internship program to successfully graduate. Night classes run from 5:30pm-8:30pm twice a week.


