

Expansion of Move Over Law to All Vehicles on Side of Highway: requires all drivers to exercise due care to avoid colliding with a motor vehicle that is parked, stopped or standing on the shoulder or any portion of a parkway or controlled-access highway (Chapter 517 of 2023).



Speed Cameras in Highway Work Zones: protects highway workers by establishing a photo speed violation monitoring system on controlled-access highways and the Thruway when construction or maintenance work is occurring and a work area speed limit is in place (Chapter 421 of 2021).



Though Mike voted against the entire 2024-25 State Budget because of its broken process and runaway spending, he did advocated for a Back-to-Basics approach to state spending that would invest in infrastructure in order to ensure public safety, improve commerce and help citizens commute and get around town more efficiently. As Minority Ranking Member of the Transportation Committee, he fought for an increase in funding for local infrastructure programs in our community and was pleased restorations were made to the proposed cuts to the Consolidated Local Street and Highway Improvement Program (CHIPS).<sup>1</sup>

## **YELLOW DOT PROGRAM:**

To help keep us safe after a car crash or other emergency, Assemblyman Mike Norris is partnering with the New York Sheriffs' Association to promote their Yellow Dot Program. This free public safety program provides a Yellow Dot Kit to New Yorkers so they can stick a "yellow dot" on their driver's side rear window of their vehicle to notify first responders that vital medical information can be found in the glove compartment in case there is an emergency. This information is critical to protect your life, and you never know when an emergency may happen. More than 2 million free Yellow Dot kits have already been distributed to New Yorkers.
